

The body of Miss Gertrude Donahue, formerly of Barre, who was drowned Tuesday night in Lake Dunmore after the canoe which she and Ralph Smith occupied had overturned, was found yesterday afternoon at 3:30. Three divers from Burlington had worked continuously all Wednesday afternoon and yesterday until they finally succeeded in locating the body. Smith, who Tuesday night was found unconscious about eight feet from the water's edge, regained consciousness yesterday completely enough to furnish a much clearer account of the accident. He says that when about 250 feet from shore he attempted to put his coat on the broken canoe seat upon which he sat. In doing so the canoe overturned. Both young people were fairly good swimmers and decided to swim ashore. Miss Donahue became exhausted three times and each time Smith floated and held the young lady up. After the third assistance Miss Donahue declared she was sufficiently rested and proceeded. Smith does not remember more than that and knew nothing of the drowning until brought to consciousness yesterday morning. Frederick M. Kempton of South Main street and Miss Marion Tilden had just returned last evening from Middlebury when a message informed them that the body had been located. They will return this afternoon in order to attend the funeral, which will be held in Middlebury to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

COMPERS GOES TO EUROPE.

To Attend International Congress of Trade Unions at Amsterdam.
New York, July 11.—Samuel Compers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was among the passengers to-day on board the Mauretania. He will represent the American labor organizations at an international congress of trade unions at Amsterdam, Holland. The congress is a revival of similar meetings held before the war, with headquarters in Berlin.
Other delegates are Daniel J. Tobin, treasurer of the American Federation of Labor, and J. J. Hines, president of the Amalgamated Sheet Metal Workers' International alliance. The congress will be in session from one to two weeks, after which Mr. Compers probably will make another tour of the labor centers in France and England.

SAILORS RUSHED TO SEA.

In Order to Fill Vacant Places in Two U. S. Fleets.
Great Lakes, Ill., July 11.—Preparations were begun to-day at the naval training station here to dispatch four thousand sailors to sea within the next few days.
The order of the bureau of navigation was received yesterday and the first contingent will be started for the Atlantic coast to-night. It was said that demobilization of reserves had thinned the ranks of the warships of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and that the order was made "rush" to meet the urgent need for man-power.
"NEW ERA" MOVEMENT.
New England Presbyterian Churches Are to Be Represented.
New York, July 11.—The Presbyterian church of the synods of New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Baltimore and New England will be represented by delegates to the first summer conference of the Presbyterian new era movement at Stony Brook, N. Y., from July 28 to Aug. 3. The plans to carry out the program of the new era movement for war reconstruction work, social service evangelistic campaigns and various other Christian enterprises will be perfected.

ORDER COMING BACK IN ROME.
