Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

Samuel W. Pelham, 17, of Poultney was the first to enlist in the navy under the new appropriation bill.

Miss Freda Passman of St. Albans fell from a street car in that city Wednesday evening and was badly injured, just how seriously is not known.

The Nelson & Hall company is to rebuild its woodworking plant in Enosburg, which was burned about a year ago. This is a venerable packing box industry.

Elmer C. Goodrich a strawberry grower living on the road from Hardwick to Greensboro, estimates his income so far this season from that berry at \$1,000.

The water supply in Hardwick for manufacturing purposes shows no sign of falling. The reservoir is practically full and no curtailment of power is expected.

A farmhouse in Starkboro owned by M. E. Crowley of Bristol and occupied by C. W. Daniels was burned the first of the week, the loss being only partially covered by insurance.

The water in streams in Enosburg Falls has been so low that the first of the week farmers could not get enough power to run their milking machines and had to resort to the old-fashioned system of milking.

Mrs. H. S. Howe of Rutland, while a guest at the Sherwood house in Burlington Thursday, slipped and fell on the floor of the hotel office in such a way as to break her hip. She was taken to a Burlington hospital.

Jerry Benoit of Winoski, a laborer, has filed a petition in bankruptcy with United States Clerk Henry Conlin of Rutland. He has liabilities of \$450 and assets of \$150, all of which is claimed exempt.

Mrs. Lu Y. C. Bailey observed her 91st birthday anniversary at her home in Newport recently, entertaining a few of her relatives for the occasion. Her sister, Mrs. Sisco from Troy, over 80 years of age, made the birthday cake.

William Knapp of New York, while fishing in Lake Dunmore, caught a rainbow trout that weighed seven pounds. The fish was caught in deep water, while trolling with a live minnow. For 20 years Mr. Knapp has visited Lake Dunmore for a fishing trip.

Kenneth Spooner and John S. Merrill, North Sheldon boys, noticing a washout on the railroad June 16, by quick work managed to warn an incoming train in time to save it from serious consequences, and the railway company, realizing the importance of their act, rewarded them in a substantial manner.

Three more deer have been shot in the open zone in Westminster. R. M. Page of Putney west hill shot an eight-point buck July 14 and on July 15 Stanley M. Fullam of Westminster Midway farm shot an 11-point buck. On the same day Justin R. Holden of Westminster secured a spike-horn.

The Hall, Hartwell & Co. underwear factory in Rutland opened up Monday, employing 25 women and girls and expects to be employing 100 before Aug. 1. The company manufactures men's athletic underwear. Miss Margaret Crane of Rutland is the local manager of the plant.

Reginald Burns met with a peculiar accident while in bathing at Newport a few days ago. A motor launch backed from one of the stalls, hitting him on the hand and head, cutting gashes and bruising one eye badly. Stunned by the blow, he went under and was caught by the propeller of the boat, which inflicted a long gash on his back.

G. J. Thompson, who fell from a load of hay to the barn floor at his home in South Londonderry, is in a critical condition and nearly helpless. A young girl who lives at the Turner farm in the same town was also badly hurt the same day, falling from a tree to the ground. One arm was broken and her face was badly hurt as she struck it on a stub when she landed.

A dynamite cap which Nicholas Jacobs of East Enosburg was holding July 7 blew up, with an explosion that was heard for nearly a mile, blowing off the end of the forefinger on his right hand and injuring the thumb on his left hand. The forefinger had to be amputated at the first joint.

Three open deer hunting zones have been established around Rutland county apple orchards within the past few days by the state fish and game commissioner. These zones are about the orchards of Edwin E. Chapin and Angelo Freeman in East Pittsford, that of B. C. Buxton in Middletown Springs, and the third is about the orchard of J. A. Stewart in Clarendon. The establishment of these zones stops orchard owners from making any claim against the state for damages done by deer.

The three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Powers of Brownington was maimed for life one day last week when he was playing in the grass of the hayfield and was run onto by the mowing machine driven by Mr. Powers. One leg was severed and the other was badly bruised. After reaching the hospital at Orleans, it was deemed necessary to remove part of the foot on the remaining leg. Although very weak from loss of blood, the little fellow is quite comfortable.

Rev. Herbert J. Hinman, who for the month of July has been supplying the pulpit of the Congregational church in Lyndonville, has received and accepted a call to be the pastor of the church. Mr. Hinman for two and one-half years has been working on the Pilgrim Memorial fund and previous to that was pastor of a Nebraska church. Inasmuch as he has been with the church for a month already, his term of service dates from July 1, his salary to be \$2,000 a year and the use of the parsonage. FATHER COMES TO CLAIM SON.

Walden Boy Supposed Him Dead—Peculiar Circumstances of Case.

Walden, July 19.—William Bell, father of Harley Bell, the South Walden boy, whose case in local court created considerable interest, and who was last week placed in charge of the state department of charities and probation, was in town Tuesday and went to Walden to claim his son.

Publicity of the case in which the boy figured is responsible for the father coming here from Maine to find the boy, whom he thought dead. The boy, it will be remembered, testified in court that he had no father or mother. It seems that when the boy was a child, the father was sentenced to Atlanta for receiving smuggled goods for a term of nine years. After he had served two years, a dying man made a confession that he was the guilty party and Mr. Bell was pardoned by President Taft. His first wife died and after his release was again married in Maine. While his present wife was in a hospital recently, he visited her and was recognized by a patient in the same ward, who had been a former neighbor back here in Vermont and knew of the circumstances of the case here through newspapers sent by relatives.

TO BE QUEEN'S GUIDE. Middlebury Summer School Professor Invited by Marie of Rumania.

Middlebury, July 20.—Viscount G. D. Dela Jarrie, a member of the faculty of the French school at Middlebury college summer sessions, has been chosen by Queen Marie of Rumania to act as her guide during her proposed visit to America. Professor Dela Jarrie, as a representative of the French government, spent two months in Rumania last winter. He has received word that Queen Marie expects to arrive in this country the last of October probably accompanied by Princess Elizabeth, her daughter, and a retinue of about 20 persons.

ART EDUCATION DEMANDED.

Is Asked for by Western Drawing and Manual Training Association.

More attention should be given to art education in the United States, according to the Western Drawing and Manual Training association, whose resolutions emphasizing the importance of good designs and highest workmanship have just been published by the bureau of education, department of the interior. The resolutions provide:

Good Designing Necessary.

Whereas, It has been shown that good design and the highest type of workmanship in American manufactures are absolutely necessary to enable the United States to hold a foremost place in the world's commerce, and compete with designers abroad; and Whereas, The time has come when we must recognize the importance of art education and the value of enhancing our products artistically; and Whereas, Necessity demands that we train designers capable of expressing artistically and esthetically, American ideas in conformity with our concepts, customs, and environment in order that we develop and gain in prestige and trade after the war;

Better Training Asked.

That credits equivalent to those allowed for other subjects be given for art work in the schools; that the board of education, regents and superintendents recognize the importance of providing better training in free-hand drawing, design, and color practice, and provide salaries which make possible the continued services of competent art instructors and supervisors of art and manual training, in order that the talented students may find opportunity for training
