

## \$75,000 SUIT IS ENTERED

Groveton, N. H., Man Sues for Commissions and Services in Wood Dealings

INTERNATIONAL PAPER CO. NAMED

This Is One of the Largest Suits of the Kind Entered in U. S. Court in Vermont

A. P. Carpenter of Brattleboro, U. S. marshal, has filed with the Vermont secretary of state papers in the case of Emil J. Gans of Groveton, N. H., vs. the International Paper company of Bellows Falls, and which is returnable to the October term of district court in Rutland. The suit is to recover \$75,000, which the plaintiff claims is owed him for business that he did for the defendant, the large part of which was in purchasing pulpwood.

The papers set forth that the defendant owes the plaintiff a commission on 200,000 cords of pulpwood, \$50,000; services in 1916-17-18-19, \$1,000; commission on 65 cords of pulpwood bought of F. R. Hastings, \$169.33; commission on 1500 cords of pulpwood bought of Scott Bros., \$1875; totaling \$53,044.33. The remainder is for other work that the plaintiff alleges he did, which included the purchase of some 100,000 cords of pulpwood, upon which there was a commission of 27 cents a cord.

This case is one of the biggest of this kind ever brought in court in a long time. The plaintiff sets forth that the defendant has not carried out the contract existing between himself and the defendants.
