

JOHNSON WILL NOT ATTEND.

Meeting Which Will Consider the Mays Suspension Case.

Chicago, Aug. 9.—President B. B. Johnson of the American league, before leaving for the east to-day, said he would not attend the meeting of the league called for Monday by the owners of the New York Americans to discuss the case of Pitcher Carl Mays, who is under suspension by the league president. He based his refusal to attend the meeting on the ground that it had been called without authority.

President Johnson's business in the east, he said, was in connection with the hearing Monday on the injunction restraining the American league from interfering with the New York club in efforts to use Mays as a player.

NOW WANTS TO LIVE.

Hamby Had Previously Shown Unconcern Over Impending Electro-cution.

Ossining, N. Y., Aug. 9.—Putting aside the indifferent attitude he has maintained toward electro-cution, Gordon Fawcett Hamby, sentenced to die for murdering a teller of the East Brooklyn Savings bank last December, stated in the death house of Sing Sing prison last night that he would not seek cancellation of the appeal prepared by his

counsel, Frank X. McCaffrey of Brooklyn. He had previously declared he wanted to pay the death penalty and "the sooner the better."
