BOLSHEVIK TROOPS BEING CUT DOWN

Counter Offensive of Northwestern Russian Army is Reported to Be Making Good Progress. London, Aug. 16.—Several battalions of bolshevik troops have been wiped out in the new counter offensive of the northwestern Russian army along the river Luga, southwest of Petrograd, according to dispatches from Helsinki, dated Wednesday. The soviet forces also lost many prisoners and machine guns and much ammunition. On the west bank of the Luga, in the region east of Narva, the anti-bolshevik troops occupied Alexandroff-Skai Gorka. East of Pskov, south of Narva, other anti-bolshevik detachments made a raid against the soviet front and captured 500 prisoners. Near Podsey, an entire soviet regiment is declared to have deserted to the Estonians. A Well-Shod Voice. State Forester Hastings is re-allotting the lookouts for prevention against fire and is making arrangements for a lookout to be placed on Spruce mountain in Orange. It is a very slightly place and one which is visited quite a good deal, so that it is probably that two houses will be constructed. There is quite a lot of pulp cutting in that section and the work bids fair to need the protection of a fire warden for some years, so that more substantial buildings are being constructed than would be otherwise. He is gathering his information to install lookouts where a wide range of wood country can be seen. Probably one of the best that he has is the one on Burke mountain. POLISH PEOPLE GAVE THANKS TO AMERICA To Herbert Hoover They Declare That Without America's Aid They Would Not Have Been Able to Pull Through the Past Six Months. Warsaw, Thursday, Aug. 14 (By the Associated Press).—Men and women, representing the socialist party in Poland, accompanied by the minister of labor, called on Herbert Hoover, chairman of the allied relief organization, to-day and presented a memorial. "Please present to the American people," the memorial said, "our feeling of gratitude. But for America, we would not have been able to pull through the last six months. We pledge ourselves to devote our strength to the orderly rebuilding of a stable government. "We are not bolshevik, but we are patriotic, thinking people, who know that our ideals of democracy are best served by preparing the minds of the masses for the responsibilities of a socialist government and that such progress only is sound when accepted by the votes of an intelligent majority. "We know the difficulties and privations through which the Polish republic must pass during the next year and will endeavor to live up to your slogan of full production on farms and in coal mines and factories. We must beg our American brothers in democracy to have patience with us and not to remove their support until we can get on our feet. Give us just one more year of credits and other active sympathy and we will emerge a strong, self-respecting nation prepared to face the world alone." The President.
