

BETHEL MAN DIED OF INJURIES

Arthur J. Miner Was in Automobile Which was Struck By Trolley Car

HE HAD RECENTLY SERVED IN ARMY

Body Being Brought to Bethel From Woonsocket, R. I., To-day

Bethel, Aug. 21.—Arthur J. Miner, son of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Miner, died yesterday at the City hospital in Woonsocket, R. I., as a result of injuries received a few days ago, when an electric car collided with an automobile in which he was riding at Lincoln, R. I.

The young man, who was discharged from the army a few months ago, was employed in Worcester, Mass. His mother and two of his sisters were near him at the hospital. The body will be brought here on the late train this afternoon.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Wallingford Power Station Gutted—Village Without Lights.

Wallingford, Aug. 21.—The small sheet iron power station of the R. R., L. & P. Co. was completely gutted by fire Tuesday evening when the small plant was struck by lightning during the severe electrical storm. No one was in the structure at the time.

As a result of the fire, the entire village was in darkness throughout the night and it will probably be four or five days before the station is again placed in working order. All of the fixtures, fuses, switchboard and equipment were destroyed although the sheet iron building was not injured. The loss will be comparatively small.

SELLING FOOD IN SCHOOLHOUSES.

Army Surplus Being Disposed of in New York City.

New York, Aug. 21.—Supplies of army foodstuffs were placed on sale here today at 58 public schools throughout the city under the direction of the department of markets. Figuring on a population of 5,500,000, officials estimated that there will be available 15,444 pounds of food for every resident.

DELAY STRIKE FOR CONFERENCE

Steel Workers Instruct Committee to Try to Meet Corporation

FAILURE WOULD MEAN A WALK OUT

Vote for the Strike Is Said to Have Been Nearly Unanimous

Youngstown, Ohio, Aug. 21.—On the success of leaders of 24 labor unions affiliated in the steel industry in obtaining a conference with representatives of the United States Steel corporation during the next 10 days depends whether there is to be a nation-wide strike of steel workers. Union leaders, who canvassed the strike vote here yesterday, say 98 per cent of the men voting on the question voted to walk out.

Instead of calling a general strike forthwith, a conference committee of six, headed by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was instructed to try to arrange the meeting with the representatives of the steel corporation in a final attempt to adjust demands made by the unions. In case of failure to obtain the conference, the committee is under instructions to set a strike date forthwith.

A meeting of the conference committee is to be held within a few days to map out a plan for approaching the representatives of the steel corporation. This meeting, it is said, may not be held until Mr. Gompers, who is en route from Europe, arrives. The date and place for the meeting were not set.

STRIKE MAY AFFECT "MOVIES."

Chicago Theatre Unrest Is Spreading from the "Legit" Places.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Eight downtown theatres remained closed today as a result of the strike of actors, stage hands and musicians. There is little chance of any of the closed houses being reopened for to-night, according to the leaders in the movement against the Producing Managers' association. The managers of the houses affected said the strike lines seemed to be tightening.

Predictions were made to-day by leaders of the strike that burlesque vaudeville and motion picture houses soon would close unless the producing managers recognize the Equity Association of Actors and Artists.

WORKMAN'S TAMPERING CAUSED EXPLOSION

Raritan Arsenal Disaster of Aug. 4 So Explained in Report of Special Board of Inquiry.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 21.—The explosion at the Raritan arsenal on Aug. 4, resulting in the death of seven persons, was caused by an employe tampering with explosive material, according to the report of a special board of inquiry, made public to-day by Secretary Baker.

AUSTRIA MAY SIGN AUGUST 30

And No Essential Modification in Terms of Treaty Is Expected

DESPITE A PROTEST BY VISCOUT MORLEY

Foreign Minister Tittoni of Italy Protested Against Change

Paris, Aug. 21 (Havas).—At the meeting of the supreme council of the peace conference Tuesday, Viscount Morley, one of the British delegates, declared it to be in the interest of the allies to alleviate the burden on Austria and asked for a revision of the economic and financial clauses of the treaty with that country, according to The Echo de Paris. Foreign Minister Tittoni of Italy protested, it is said, declaring that efforts making for the restoration of the former Austrian power would injure Italian interests. The newspaper says no essential modification will be made in the treaty.

It is believed here that the Austrian treaty may be signed Aug. 30.

QUIMET AND JONES ARE FAVORITES

To Win Their Way to the Final Round of the National Golf Championship at Pittsburg.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 21.—Francis Quimet of Boston and Robert T. Jones, Jr. of Atlanta, were favorites to win their way to the final round of the national amateur golf championship when the players started to-day in the third round.

Quimet played J. Wood Platt of the North Hills club of Philadelphia to-day. Platt has been playing good golf in the tournament, and the Boston player did not take him lightly. Quimet and W. C. Fowner, Jr. of Oakmont, are the only former champions remaining in the field.

Firm Wishes to Locate in Vermont.

The director of the Vermont state publicity bureau has received the following communication from a firm which wishes to find a suitable location in Vermont:

New York, Aug. 12, 1919. Secretary of State, Montpelier, Vt. Dear Sir: We manufacture piano actions and piano hammers, essentially a wood-working proposition, although we do metal working as well, manufacturing the hardware (brass and steel), used in the manufacture of our product.
