### ATTEMPT TO SMUGGLE GERMAN MONEY FAILS

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Berlin, Wednesday, Aug. 20 (By the Associated Press).—The mystery surrounding the identity of the individuals involved in an attempt to smuggle 20,000,000 marks across the German-Swiss frontier is approaching solution, according to private reports from Weimar, where Chief of Police Ernst of Berlin is conferring with cabinet ministers relative to steps to be taken.

Police authorities claim to have under arrest or detention all persons engaged in the conspiracy, which collapsed when the airplanes, which were to carry the money, securities and jewels into Switzerland, were intercepted near Nuremberg, Bavaria.

A London dispatch received last night stated that the valuables and money which were being taken to Switzerland were believed to be the property of the former German crown prince.
