Storm of Sunday Did Much Damage in Neighboring Towns.

A combination rain, hail, wind and electrical storm last Sunday did little damage in this town. Henry E. Walker's house near the Rochester line was struck by lightning, which followed the chimney, knocking down stovepipes in the living room, but causing no fire and injuring nobody. Damages to the house are placed at \$50. The house of Joseph B. Regan on Royalton hill was similarly struck, with similar results. A sheet-iron roof was blown from S. T. Heap's barn against the piazza of his house, which was partly demolished. Trees fell in many places across roads and wires, causing much inconvenience to the public. The storm was especially violent in Stockbridge, where buckets full of hail were easily gathered. Hundreds of panes of glass were broken in the buildings of Walter K. Barrows, George T. Mills, Julius D. Blackmer and John Dutton, 2d, and the greenhouse of Henry Brooks was demolished. Large fields of corn and other crops were riddled.


