Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

I. E. Randall recently reported seeing a bear in Hydeville and his story was duplicated by Mrs. Peck of that place, who, while out berrying Saturday, saw a bear and two cubs.

The Rutland hospital is filled almost to its capacity, 50 patients being registered there Tuesday. Two or three beds in the men's ward were the only vacant ones in the house.

The body of Joseph R. Ball, many years a manufacturer of scythe blades at Waterbury, P. Q., was taken to Athens, his native town, for burial Sunday. He was 72 years old and a veteran of the Civil war.

A petition in bankruptcy has been filed in the office of Clerk Henry Conlin of the United States court by William H. Morpome of Burlington. His liabilities are given as \$550 and he has assets of \$853, of which \$300 is claimed to be exempt.

Mrs. Russell A. Alger, who died Aug. 24 in Detroit, was a native of Bennington and attended school at Mount Anthony seminary at Old Bennington when a girl. Her husband was secretary of war during the administration of President McKinley and a governor of Michigan.

A two-year-old dog, weighing about 100 pounds, was killed by a train between Rutland and Ludlow Tuesday and the body was still on the pilot of the engine when the train reached the Rutland yards. It is supposed that the deer was confused by the bright searchlights and gave a leap, landing on the pilot. All four legs and its neck were broken, but the body was unharmed.

No agreement having been reached between the officers of the Black Cat Tackle company of Bennington and the employees who have been out on strike since Aug. 14, the mill will be closed the last of this week, unless there are new developments before that time. The strike does not interfere with the nainsook athletic underwear department, which will be continued in operation indefinitely.

Lyman S. Hooker, a well-known St. Johnsbury machinist, died at Brightwood hospital in that place Aug. 24, aged 70 years. Mr. Hooker was born in South Cabot, but went to St. Johnsbury at the age of 17 years, learning the machinist's trade. After 10 years, he established a shop of his own and later joined with Henry Dupont in the manufacture of the Dupont trip hammer, the business some years later being purchased by the Fairbanks company, which retained Mr. Hooker, and for 10 years he had charge of the manufacture of the hammer.
