

Mrs. Nancy Smith, the elderly lady who suffered quite serious injuries from the automobile collision of Dr. E. H. Bailey's big Wagon Six touring car and the runabout owned of A. L. Temple of Montpelier Wednesday evening, rested as comfortably as could be expected yesterday. Upon further examination, no bones were found to be broken or dislocated but the neck and shoulders of the woman were badly wrenched and cause considerable pain unless she keeps the same posture in bed, which of course is impossible. The extent of the injuries cannot be determined, owing to the advanced years of the woman, though it is thought that she will recover in time.

A team caused a little diversion yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock when it backed into a hydrant on the corner of Highland avenue and Washington street, broke the four-inch pipe and then disappeared. The water pressure at this spot is in the vicinity of 125 pounds, which was very evident after the break, for a geyser-like stream shot into the air for 25 or 30 feet, flooding one side of Washington street. This continued until Water Superintendent F. O. Lee and his assistant, George H. Cook, could reach the hydrant with the shut-off key for the main pipe. Ten minutes after the break the two men had accomplished the task of stopping the flow; they started the work of taking out the hydrant. Supt. Lee decided to move the hydrant from this location, since it seems to be in a hazardous location. The break yesterday was the third one which had occurred at this spot in the past five years and for this reason, more than any other, the change in location was determined upon.
