Sinn Fein Leaders Ridicule Plan for Hearing at the Bar of Parliament

UPHOLD MANDATE OF IRISH PEOPLE

Will Not Take Oath of Allegiance to Great Britain

Dublin, Oct. 11.—Sinn Fein leaders here ridicule the statement that they will demand a hearing at the bar of Parliament, or are prepared to take the oath of allegiance to Great Britain. They say their mandate from the Irish people is for the establishment of an Irish republic, and nothing else.

TO WORK IN VERMONT

Two Men Added to Staff of Vermont State Forester. Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 11.—Percy H. Morrill and H. E. Grube, both graduates of the New York state college of forestry at Syracuse, have been added to the staff of the Vermont state forester as technical assistants.

It is understood that Vermont plans elaborate work in its forests, and that the two men, if they make good under the state forestry department, will be assigned as chief foresters of districts of the state.

Morrill was in the army longer than any other man who went from the college of forestry, which sent nearly 90 per cent of its entire enrollment of faculty, alumni and students, for he went into the French ambulance service before America was actively in the war.

GERMAN ARMY CAPTURES RIGA?

No Confirmation of Report Has Been Received in London

BUT THAT RESULT WOULD NOT SURPRISE

Because of Greater Number of German Troops Located There

London, Oct. 11.—Confirmation of a newspaper report that German forces have captured Riga is awaited here, but if the disparity of the rival forces is as great as reported in some dispatches, the success of the attack on the city would not be surprising.

"Germany's new war" is featured in this morning's newspaper. The whereabouts of General Von Der Goltz continues to be the subject of contradictory rumors and estimates of the size of the army commanded by Colonel Avaloff-Bermond.

Prince Peter Lieven, formerly of the Russian foreign office, is superintending the co-ordination of the forces commanded by those two leaders, it being intended to transfer the occupation of Lithuania and Courland to a nominally Russian-Lithuanian army composed in part of Germans from the ranks of General Von Der Goltz' troops.

Latest news received by the government is described as confirming the view that Germany is deliberately scheming to secure a controlling position in Russia and that she probably contemplates the occupation of Petrograd.
