ABOUT THE STATE

Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

The apple crop of the Champlain valley is said to be below normal by several thousand barrels. High winds during September was the cause of the great damage to the crop.

Rev. B. B. Hanson of Wilder left for Marion, Ia., Wednesday. Mr. Hanson has been the pastor of the federated churches of Wilder for the past two years and now leaves for Iowa, where he will take up the work in the Methodist Episcopal church.

Brattleboro is to have a special town meeting soon to give authority to the selectmen to put in a system of drainage for Main street, on which the surface water for some years has proved troublesome. It is estimated that the cost would be about \$4,500.

C. Merle Whitney paid a fine of \$5 and costs, the whole amounting to \$11.06, which he paid, in Brattleboro court, because he ran a truck belonging to the Brattleboro-Springfield motor transportation line with only one front lamp lighted. Mr. Whitney stated that he did not know the other light was out, but was informed that it was his business to know whether it was or not.

Mrs. Joseph Shuckett and Mrs. Grace Leno, the two women who were injured when the Dodge touring car in which they were riding with two soldiers from Fort Ethan Allen went over a 150-foot bank in Burlington, are still in the Mary Fletcher hospital, both with fractured arms and broken bones in other parts of the body, as well as bruises. The men, Sergeant Frank Marcotte and Private Vincent Gorney, have been in the hospital at Fort Ethan Allen for treatment of minor cuts and bruises.

On Saturday, Oct. 18, two tablets will be dedicated by the Vermont chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, at Arlington. They will be placed near the site of the residences occupied during a part of the revolutionary period by Gov. Thomas Chittenden and Ethan Allen. These residences were in close proximity and boulders will be placed on either side of a wall leading through a little park near the railroad station and the tablets placed on these boulders. This is on land owned by the Rutland railroad company, which leases the property to the Sons of the American Revolution. The principal addresses will be given by J. K. Batchelder of Arlington.

Two animals are in advanced registry, one milking as a 3-year-old 68 1/2 lbs. per day and the other at 30 months this milking 48 1/2 lbs., and making 29 and 13.5 lbs. butter, respectively, in seven days. Both these animals are due soon after the sale. A few extra heavy producers now fresh and milking from 40 to 60 lbs. per day; others to freshen soon. This herd has been gotten together with a great deal of care and expense, most of the cows having been chosen from large herds. Not a heifer that did not milk 40 lbs. or more at first calving. One 3-year-old is now milking about 45 lbs. per day.
