

KRONSTADT FALL NOT CONFIRMED

British Admiralty Has Received No Corroboration of Reports

ONLY LIGHT CRUISERS IN THAT VICINITY

A Stockholm Report Stated That British Had Entered Fortress

London, Oct. 17.—Confirmation of reports that British naval forces have taken the fortress of Kronstadt on the Gulf of Finland, west of Petrograd, has not been received at the admiralty offices here. Dispatches telling of the capitulating of Kronstadt are not credited, it being said the British have only light cruisers in the vicinity, which are incapable of successfully challenging the fortress. Admiralty officials state there was no reason for a British attack on the place.

Bolshevik troops are said to have captured Kiev, but in this region the situation is obscure. It was reported last week that Kiev was in the hands of General Petlura's Ukrainian army, which advanced against General Denikine's left flank following Petlura's declaration of war on the Cossack chieftain.

Further details of the situation of Moscow have not been received but it appears the bolshevik armies in that region are launching counter attacks against General Denikine's lines. With the exception of the capture of Kiev, the bolshevik seem to have been repulsed along the new front.

There is also some uncertainty as to the exact situation in Lithuania, where Russian and Lithuanian troops have been mobilized. Lithuanian troops have been ordered to advance against Shavil in the government of Kovno. If this move should be carried out the Lithuanians would be in rear of the Germano-Russian forces which advanced against Riga last week and have since last Friday been fighting Lettish and Estonian troops in that city.

In the meantime Admiral Kolehak, head of the all-Russian government at Omsk and commander of the anti-bolshevik elements on the eastern Russian front, is advancing rapidly in pursuit of the soviet armies which have been ordered to retire. The location of the line of battle in this region has not been reported recently but it is known to be west of the Kobol river, which runs through the eastern foothills of the Ural.

Stockholm, Oct. 17 (By the Associated Press).—The fortress of Kronstadt has capitulated after a bombardment by a British fleet which, after the foe had surrendered, entered the harbor, according to a dispatch received here.

Kronstadt is a fortress and seaport at the head of the Gulf of Finland, two miles west of Petrograd. The fortress was begun by Peter I, but has in recent years been entirely rebuilt. The port which was the chief station of the Russian navy, with a naval dockyard and a commercial harbor, has been in the hands of the bolshevik since the soviet regime took power in December, 1917.

SERVED LONGEST IN CIVIL WAR

Marshall Montgomery Died in St. Johnsbury—Was County's Oldest Lawyer.

St. Johnsbury, Oct. 17.—Marshall Montgomery, one of the oldest members of the Caledonia county bar, died yesterday after a long illness due to old age. Mr. Montgomery was born in Walden March 20, 1839. He was educated in the public schools and at Peacham academy and read law with the late Bliss N. Davis of Danville. Mr. Montgomery was admitted to the bar of this county in 1869. He was state's attorney from 1884 to 1886 and was referee in bankruptcy for many years.

His civil war record was a distinguished one. He enlisted in May, 1861, was promoted in 1863 to the captaincy of Co. D, 10th United States colored troops, and served continuously until May, 1865, when he was discharged at Galveston, Tex. His term of service, five years and two days, is the longest Civil war record of any man in Vermont.

Mr. Montgomery's wife, who was Miss Flora Sibley of Lacombe, N. H., died a number of years ago. He is survived by one daughter, Grace, wife of Samuel J. Gibbons of St. Johnsbury. The veteran lawyer was a charter member of Chamberlin post and that body will conduct the funeral, which will be held on Saturday.

UNITED STATES IS LEFT OUT

Cannot Be on Co-ordination Commission Named by Peace Conference

AFTER THE FORMAL TREATY RATIFICATION

Admission to Commission Is Held Up by Failure of Senate to Ratify

Paris, Thursday, Oct. 16 (By the Associated Press).—Immediately after formal ratification of the treaty of peace with Germany, the supreme council of the peace conference will probably name a co-ordination commission, the duties of which will be to decide what bodies shall have jurisdiction over matters not definitely assigned by the treaty. This commission will, in a way, carry on part of the work which has been performed by the supreme council, which is expected to close within six weeks.

Manifestly, the United States cannot be represented on this co-ordination commission until she ratifies the treaty. General regret is apparent over the impossibility to start all the commissions created under the treaty with a full membership from the great powers, as it would be much simpler if all the permanent members of the various commissions could begin work simultaneously. In the Rhineland, the Belgian, French and British members of the inter-allied commission, of which an American will be the fourth member, will probably be empowered by their governments to proceed with civil administration in spite of the fact the Rhineland convention requires American co-operation.

In American occupied territory military control will be continued by common consent until the United States Senate ratifies the treaty and makes the establishment of civil government possible. The co-ordination commission will have lesser powers than those held by the supreme council. Its members will not be plenipotentiaries, but will be required to refer important matters to their various foreign offices for decision. This commission will deal only with matters relating to the German treaty, and will not include in the general discussion of Russian, Turkish or other international problems. The creation of the co-ordination commission will end the "international foreign office," as the supreme council has been termed. The various foreign offices will function as usual.

The work of the American delegation will be largely advisory, but there is a general disposition to consult American representatives on all important matters relative to the execution of the treaty terms.

TREATY CLAUSES SOON EFFECTIVE

As Soon as in Force Germany Must Surrender 120,000,000,000 Marks for Reparation of Devastated Territories.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Directly the peace treaty comes in force, through execution of ratification by three of the allied and associated powers and Germany, many of its clauses will become effective. Chief among these is that requiring Germany to surrender 120,000,000,000 marks for the reparation of devastated territories.

Other provisions of the treaty which will become effective require:

Destruction of uncompleted German surface warships.

Disarmament of auxiliary ships of war, four of which are in neutral ports and 28 in German ports.

Formal surrender of German surface warships interned in allied and neutral ports.

Delivery of all German military and naval aviation material, including dirigibles, except 100 unarmed seaplanes to be retained as a part of the German mine sweeping force.

Destruction of the armament of all military forces situated within 50 kilometers from the German coast.

Notification of the number, calibre and types of guns forming the armament of the land and sea fortresses which Germany is allowed to keep.


