Stolen Car Found.

Property of E. L. Shuttlefield of Burlington Located in Boston.

Burlington, Oct. 23.—The large White touring car, stolen from E. L. Shuttlefield Friday night when he left it in front of the Marble theatre, has been recovered by the Boston police department, according to word received from them by Sheriff J. H. Allen, who had previously written to Captain J. H. King, in charge of the automobile department of criminal investigation for the police, in return for Mr. Shuttlefield's car the Boston people want the Ford car, which was found on Shelburne road, for that was stolen in Boston a few days previous to the stealing of the Shuttlefield car. The machines have been identified by the numbers on the engines and the maker's numbers. The license numbers were changed by the thief.

It has been learned that two young men drove up in front of the Marble and one of them at once got out and without any apparent hesitancy got into the White car, which he evidently knew how to operate. Later the Ford car was found beside the road without its number plates and as the Shuttlefield car was found concealed in the grass it was taken for granted that they had been exchanged for those on the Ford. The description of the White car was good without the number plates as it had on a permanent top which is not common.
