Hollister of Goddard seminary, who is attending the general convention of the Universalist church at Baltimore, Md., telegraphed the Times to-day that the denomination's million-dollar drive had gone over the top, the sum of \$1,265,000 having been subscribed thus far. Principal Hollister's telegram was as follows: "Million-dollar drive in the Universalist denomination went over top, \$1,265,000 being subscribed, with more to follow. Great convention; much enthusiasm; great things expected in the near future."

Through the efforts of the educational department of the Barre Woman's club, Mrs. T. S. Colton of Chicago will give a talk before the club next Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock on "Birds, Their Customs and Habits." Mrs. Colton will have mounted specimens of birds to show, will speak of their nests, migrations and many other things, and will whistle some of their bird notes. The ladies are asked to notice the change in the hour of the meeting, which is at 3 o'clock, instead of the usual time.

President S. Hollister Jackson and Secretary Athol Bell of the Granite Manufacturers' association and E. A. Harris, manager of the Intercity Tenny Service office, have for the past two days been attending the hearing of the Tenny Service company, whose electrical rates were increased somewhat on the first of September. Howard T. Sands, president of the Montpelier & Barre Lighting & Power company, was on the stand testifying almost all day yesterday in the Senate chamber of the State House. Last night the hearing was adjourned until next Wednesday morning.

James Good, jr., together with his mother, leaves to-night for their home in Boston. For the past few weeks Mr. Good has been cutting a monument to erect over his father's grave in the Catholic cemetery on Beckley street. This morning the small memorial was set. Prior to his return to Barre, Mr. Good had just been honorably discharged from the 24 division which served in every important battle at the front lines during the great war. He was urged, upon reaching Boston, to join the police force, but deferred the offer until now. He passed successfully the civil service and physical examinations and now leaves to accept the beat of a Boston regular.

### MONTPELIER

In Washington county court, the case of F. W. Mitchell vs. C. E. Lowe and Karl Knapp has been filed. It is trover, relative to wood, and the suit is to recover \$200.

Mrs. William Kelleher leaves to-night for New York, where she will be in the interest of the National Life Insurance company, supervising the starting of a new cashier in the New York office.

The hearing which has been in progress for two days in the Senate chamber of the State House before the public service commission has been continued until next week, because the Granite Manufacturers' association wants to have more time. It has asked an expert examination of the accounts of the power company and its resources, as well as an appraisal of the property. No one seemed to know anything about a rumor that has been about here that those interested in the granite business might construct a plant of their own if the increase in rates is allowed.

It is expected that the Graham case will be disposed of at the present time of Washington county court and that former Attorney-General H. G. Barber and Hale K. Darling of Chelsea will assist State's Attorney Davis in the prosecution, while W. B. C. Stickney and Rufus E. Brown will defend ex-Gov. Graham.

The report of an automobile accident in which Lewis Cohen of Montpelier hit Dan McAvoy, a small child, on Cross street, was made last evening to the secretary of state's office. The child ran in front of the automobile and although the driver stopped as soon as he could, the child was hit by the machine. No injury took place. Isabelle Jackson of Bethel reports that she ran into the rear end of another car while driving because of the front machine having stopped owing to another car being in front of it. No damage was done. Frank Connolly of Barre has reported an accident that took place on Washington street in Barre Oct. 18, when his automobile bumped into the rear of another machine, doing practically no damage.

A study portrait of Sheriff F. H. Tracy now adorns the office of the jail. The portrait shows the genial sheriff enclosed in smoke reveries, a twinkle about his eye and smile on his lips. It was the work of Jack Williams, one of the Boston newspaper men, and was recently framed and presented to Mr. Tracy with the following inscription on it, "An appreciation of his unflinching courtesy, to Sheriff Frank H. Tracy of Washington county, Vermont."

A. G. Eaton Friday afternoon settled his account as administrator of the estate of the late M. S. Searles, late of Montpelier, while H. L. Sparrow of East Montpelier was appointed administrator of the estate of Clarinda F. Slayton, late of Calais. Mrs. Alexandra Johnson of Berlin was appointed guardian of Esther, Alfred and Carl Johnson, minors, living in Berlin.

Tax Commissioner John Avery has commenced the work of checking up the estates in the probate offices of the state, the purpose being to find out what estates are subject to taxation. The interest on the inheritance tax due the direct state tax due from the estates. It will require quite a good deal of effort to go through the 15 probate districts.

### PTERODACTYL SKULLS FOUND.

Remains of Extinct Reptiles Located in Gove County, Kans.

Two skulls of the pterodactyl are now in the possession of H. T. Martin, curator of the museum of Kansas university. These skulls were found this summer in Gove county, Kansas, where Mr. Martin spent his vacation.

The pterodactyl was a reptile that once existed in western Kansas. It is reputed by scientists to be the first flying animal. There is no complete skeleton of the animal in existence, but there have been many reconstructions and no two are alike.

Mr. Martin found in addition to the two skulls a large number of bones of the flying reptile, and he believes that he will have enough "square parts" from the two birds to make the most complete skeleton now in existence.


