

### DRUG CLERKS VOTE TO STRIKE

About 4,500 Employed in New York Stores Will Walk Out This Week

### SODA CLERKS ARE IN THE NUMBER

Clerks Want 8-Hour Day, Closed Shop and Increase of 25 Per Cent in Wages

New York, Oct. 28.—A strike that will vitally affect New York's millions was voted early today by representatives of 4,500 drug clerks. After an all-night meeting, the men voted, 1,340 to 70, to walk out during the week, leaving the date to be determined by their officers. Union officials said that the men involved comprised 90 per cent of all the drug clerks in the city.

### TO WIELD CLUB ON PROFITEERS

U. S. Government Gave a Fair Warning and Now Begins Action

### TWO ARRESTS MADE ON SERIOUS CHARGES

Man Accused of Hoarding 1,300,000 Pounds of "War Bacon"

New York, Oct. 28.—Food profiteers in New York who had ignored a warning issued several weeks ago to cease manipulation of food prices, found themselves face to face today with criminal prosecution.

Following the arrest yesterday on federal warrants of two large handlers of food products, Arthur Williams, federal administrator, issued the following statement:

"We have given two months' notice that the food laws were made to be obeyed. We have done all that we should be asked to do. Hereafter we are going to recommend to the United States district attorney prosecution of all cases of violations in which we obtain evidence."

The two men arrested yesterday were Louis Leavitt, a manufacturer, who was accused of hoarding 1,300,000 pounds of bacon purchased from the war department, and Samuel Shapiro, a manufacturing confectioner, charged with profiteering in sugar. Both were released in bond for hearings. Mr. Williams said he had learned the name of a man who had offered 1,000 tons of sugar for sale at prices nearly double those fixed as "fair" by the food administration and that proceedings would be instituted against this man within a short time.

LAMAR CONVICTION UPHELD. Conspired to Prevent Manufacture and Shipment of Munitions.

Washington, Oct. 28.—Conviction of David Lamar and Henry B. Martin in New York in 1917 on charges of conspiring to prevent the manufacture and shipment of war munitions to the allies, was in effect upheld today by the supreme court, which declined to review the case. Lamar and Martin were sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment.

### SOVIETS REGAIN SOME POINTS

And Winter Is Coming to Their Aid in Defense of Petrograd

### TROOPS BROUGHT FROM MOSCOW

Furious Fighting Is Going on Around Kiev—Gen. Denikine Retreating

London, Oct. 28.—Winter, moving southward from the Arctic regions, is coming to the aid of bolshevik troops in Petrograd and the ability of General Yudenich to capture the former Russian capital before cold weather puts an end to his campaign seems doubtful. Soviet forces, fighting desperately against the northwestern Russian army, have succeeded in recapturing Tsarskoye Selo and Pavlovsk, south of Petrograd, and appear to be in a position to prolong the defense of the city for an indefinite period.

Some of the best soldiers in the ranks of the soviet army are said to have been rushed to Petrograd from Moscow and it is believed they form the main portion of the red forces which have intimated what appears to be a successful counter-offensive. Yudenich troops are reported to have fallen back along the front south of Petrograd, but unofficial reports would seem to indicate they have moved nearer Petrograd on the line running from Gatchina to Krassnaya Gorka. It is said the town of Gurita, on this front, has been taken from the bolsheviks.

Furious fighting is going on in and around Kiev, which was taken last week by General Denikine's forces. At some points the Denikine troops have been forced to retreat.

Letitch troops are now holding Dunamonde, below Riga and have maintained their control of the right bank of the Duna river.

### POINDEXTER A CANDIDATE.

Issues Statement in Which He Sets Forth His Claims.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 28.—Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington in a statement to the people of the United States announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for president and presented a platform of policies and principles which he will advocate in his campaign.

The Washington senator in his statement of policy denounces threats of labor leaders to tie up the railroads as "government by terror for a special class" and declares that the government must be made supreme to both capital and labor, though insisting that the just claims of labor should be recognized.

Communism, Senator Poindexter declared, is inconsistent with the vested rights of the laborer to his wage. Treating of international matters the platform remarks that the "process of making a 'supreme sacrifice' of American and of joining our fortunes with the fortunes of men everywhere" should be stopped.

In making his statement of principles, Senator Poindexter, who is the first publicly announced candidate for the Republican nomination, asserted that his announcement of policy makes it necessary for the Republican national convention in 1920 to stand by his platform should he be chosen as the party's standard bearer.

But Peace Conference Will Not Alter Territorial Provisions.

Paris, Oct. 28.—The peace conference is rapidly framing its reply to the protests of Bulgaria's representatives against some of the terms of the Bulgarian peace treaty and it seems probable that the supreme council will submit the answer during the present week, making the signing of the treaty within a fortnight a possibility.

The indications are that the conference will make some concessions to the Bulgarians, but that it will not alter it as to territorial questions.

OHIO MAYOR SUSPENDED. Governor Cox Removes Poorman of Canton for His Handling of Strike.

Columbus, O., Oct. 28.—Governor Cox yesterday suspended Mayor Charles E. Poorman of Canton because of alleged inefficient handling of the steel strike riots in that city and appealed to a committee of Canton business men to rally around Vice-President Schrantz.
