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The "lost and found" columns of the Boston newspapers look like inventories of jewelry and dogs. It is odd that a great deal of jewelry is being lost in Boston these days.

Having defeated the Moses amendment to the treaty of peace, the Senate might turn its attention to the Moses letter which stated, among other things, that Pres. Wilson's days of mental vigor (or words to that effect) were over. Perhaps Senator Moses would like to amend that.

According to the opinion of the U. S. internal revenue department, every man, woman and child in the United States is an agent of the government in ferreting out the illegal manufacture and sale of liquor; but this does not mean that amateur sleuths should be over-zealous in trying to find evidences of crime. Sleuthing with a reasonable degree of prudence and consideration for others is called for.

If the government should cut down the apportionment of sugar allowed candy manufacturers and soft drinks bottlers, etc., it might go a long way toward solving the sugar shortage without seriously interfering with the business of the aforementioned businesses. Moreover, it is reasonable that if the rationing of sugar for the home is cut down, a similar course ought to be marked out for the other consumers of sugar.

Announcement of the discontinuance of the daily bulletins from the White House on the condition of Pres. Wilson is about the best news that has come from the bedside in five weeks. When the daily bulletins concerning the condition of a man high in public life are dispensed with, it means that the patient is probably out of danger. The recuperation cannot be any too soon for the good of the country, because there are many features of national life which demand a strong, virile leadership.

The death rate from tuberculosis in Massachusetts is declared, after consultation with statistics, to be practically static since 1912 while the decline of deaths from other causes has continued during the same period. A curious fact is that the tuberculosis death rate in the rural districts of the state; that is, the progress toward the elimination of the disease in the largest city in the commonwealth has been more rapid than in the places of small population. The difference is undoubtedly due to the fact that the first impress of a

great movement of this sort is felt in the large centers of population and is spread from them to the rural districts. It is probable that the full effects of the anti-tuberculosis movement have not been experienced in the smaller places where organization of the work has not taken place.

THE VOTE OVER THE VETO.

The action of both branches of Congress in passing the prohibition enforcement measure over President Wilson's veto may be interpreted in two ways; first, as a protest against restraint from the executive, and, second, as the indication of a firm determination to stick by a course once established. There is no doubt that some of the opposition to President Wilson's veto was actuated by a feeling that Wilson's constitutional right to interpose a check on legislation was being too freely exercised and that the legislative body should assert itself by putting the measure into operation through two-thirds vote overruling the veto. But that influence on the vote in both branches was perhaps small in comparison with the determination of Congress to let nothing interfere with the program set before the country, a program decided upon through conviction that national prohibition is the desideratum of the people. The experience gained through the war period has satisfied a great many heretofore skeptical people that national sobriety to the best interests of nation and people; and those who have come to that conclusion consider that it would be a step backward in a fine program to interject a period of so-called vetness prior to the incoming of constitutional prohibition. So they, through their representatives in Congress, have continued to be consistent in their stand. It may be that President Wilson by formal proclamation can declare wartime prohibition at an end following ratification of the treaty with Germany by the Senate, but the ends to be gained by such opening up of the liquor traffic would not be sufficient to counterbalance the disadvantages.

A miracle of conversion at Washington might save daylight saving before next spring. Another Congress, with the added quality of being a representative body, may ultimately revive the plan. It does not seem possible that a hundred million people will consent permanently to having their habits and ideas regulated by representatives of class selfishness and the gentlemen who figure dividends for gas and electric lighting companies.—New York World.

 The questionnaire also was intended to permit taxpayers to put their case fairly before the federal government, especially as to claims for depletion and depreciation deductions.


FARM CENSUS JAN. 1, 1920.

Change Made from April 1 Because Farmers are Busy on Latter Date.
 Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—In announcing that the department, in an advisory capacity, is assisting the census bureau in preparing to take the 1920 census, the department of agriculture stated today that the task of taking the census of the farmers had been changed from April 1 to Jan. 1. The change was deemed advisable because the farmer usually is busy in the spring.
 Statistics the enumerators will seek include farm acreage enumerances, values and expenses; uses of the land, amount idle, drainage, livestock, farm facilities such as tractors and automobiles and fruit and forest products.
 Statistics obtained from this census largely will determine the future land policy of the government.
