Mrs. Freeman E. Edwards died Tuesday morning at her home in Bellows Falls after an illness of nearly 20 years...

H. A. Bryant's automobile, which was stolen from Eastern avenue in St. Johnsbury Saturday night, was found Monday in Barton. The car had been left there and the thief is unknown.

Mr. and Mrs. James Kidder observed their 50th wedding anniversary at their home in Enosburg Oct. 27, including a family dinner served to 26. They received about \$300 in money, besides other gifts.

A good-sized milk came up the cellar stairs at E. S. Boyd's in West Charleston recently, the door being open, and was found in the pantry. It is supposed it came to the cellar through the drain, as the house is near the river.

The annual dime census taken by the ladies' hospital aid of Bellows Falls amounted to \$387.14. The sum raised last year by this manner was \$316. The membership in the society has been increased by 50, making a total of 434 members.

Mrs. A. D. Chandler observed her 90th birthday anniversary at her home in Orleans Oct. 22, her mind and eyes being clear. She keeps well posted on all current events, sews, knits and made the fruit cake for her anniversary celebration.

"Teddy," the bear which belonged to Co. F of the former 1st Vermont Infantry, and stayed with it until the company left Spartanburg, S. C., for France, has been presented to the city of Spartanburg and is at present in the little park on the public square.

The body of George Dickinson, an eccentric woman 63 years old, was found in the woods near her home in Benson Oct. 27. There were no evidences of foul play and it is supposed death resulted from natural causes. Miss Dickinson in her early days was a popular teacher and was called a brilliant scholar.

Twenty-two carloads of sugar passed through the United States customs in St. Albans Tuesday. The sugar, apparently refined to about 95 per cent, was shipped from the St. Lawrence refinery in Montreal to big concerns in Massachusetts and Rhode Island. It is estimated that there were about 900,000 pounds of sugar in the shipment and the duty will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

A touring car owned by Charles Vail of Troyville and driven by a member of the Vail family, ran into a herd of 29 cows being driven along the Shelburne road, near Burlington, after dark Wednesday night. Three of the cows were killed and a fourth was badly injured. The cattle ran directly in front of the machine. The automobile, which contained five men beside the driver, was not badly damaged.

Clifton Niblock, who escaped from a state's prison gang working on the road at Sherburne, on Oct. 7, was arrested in Canada last week and has been returned to the prison in Windsor, Niblock's companion, John Sharkey, has not yet been apprehended. The two men managed to elude the officers in Canada until they separated, Niblock going to Cowansville, where he was arrested.
