## MANY VOTERS TURNED OUT

For Spirited Governorship Election in Massachusetts To-day

"LAW AND ORDER" ISSUE UPPERMOST

Gov. Coolidge and Richard H. Long Were the Opponents

Boston, Nov. 4.—Voters in exceptional numbers for an "off year" election went to the polls in Massachusetts to-day to register their verdict on Gov. Coolidge's course in the recent strike of police in this city.

The league of nations, and economic issues although given prominent places in the platforms of the two major parties, assumed positions subordinate by the "law and order" issue advanced by the Republicans in what proved to be the hardest fought state campaign in years.

Fair weather greeted the early voters. Party workers were busy from the start getting voters to the polls, and thousands of automobiles were enlisted in this service. Leaders kept in close touch with the balloting in the industrial centers, where both parties had concentrated their efforts. Richard H. Long, the Democratic opponent of Gov. Coolidge and a manufacturer of shoes and machinery, carried on a most vigorous campaign, appealing especially to the workers.

Drastic police regulations were in effect in this city, where state guardsmen are still on duty as a result of the police strike. Gatherings of more than two persons were forbidden about the polling places. Troops and reserve patrolmen were held in readiness for emergencies.

More than 600 new policemen were said to be on duty to-day, half of them being without uniforms. Officials claimed that with the nearly 400 patrolmen who refused to strike, police conditions were normal for an election to-day.

As all the troops now on duty came from the eastern part of the state, brief reliefs were afforded those who could make arrangements to go home and vote.

In addition to the gubernatorial contest, the election was for lieutenant governor, treasurer, auditor, and attorney general, and for the legislature. There were also three general referendum questions, one for the approval of the rearrangement of the state constitution submitted by the constitutional convention, another on the establishment of continuation schools for employed minors, and the third on regulation of interest payments by savings banks and trust companies.

In several districts there was a referendum on the question whether senators and representatives should be instructed to vote to permit the manufacture and sale of beverages containing not over 4 per cent of alcohol, and to define such beverages as "non-intoxicating."

Prohibition forces had worked actively to bring about a majority vote against this proposal on the ground that any such action by the legislature would be in conflict with the federal one-half of one per cent law.

## FIVE STATES VOTING FOR GOVERNORS TO-DAY

Massachusetts, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi and New Jersey Electors Went to the Polls—Test on Prohibition Sentiment Being Taken in Ohio.

New York, Nov. 4.—Electors in five states went to the polls to-day to ballot for governors, while election of lesser officials and decisions on constitutional questions faced the voters of several other states. Governors are being elected in Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi and New Jersey.

The elections in Ohio are being watched with interest by "wet" and "dry" advocates as there, for the first time in any state, a popular vote is being taken on the 18th amendment to the constitution. This is being accomplished by a referendum on the legislature's action in ratifying the amendment. Ohio is also taking a referendum vote on the prohibition enforcement act adopted by the legislature, and is voting on two proposed constitutional amendments to bring on prohibition.

In Kentucky, Massachusetts, Maryland, New Jersey, Virginia and New York are electing legislators. Constitutional questions confront the voters in Illinois, Nebraska and Texas. Illinois and Nebraska are electing delegates to constitutional conventions, while Texas is passing on a call for a constitutional convention and on six proposed constitutional amendments. There are no elections in the far west.

## PROHIBITION BIG ISSUE

In the New Jersey Election—Big Vote Is Being Cast.

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 4.—The chief issue in the New Jersey election to-day at which a governor and state legislature will be chosen, was prohibition. An unusually heavy vote was forecast.

State Senator Edward I. Edwards, Democratic candidate for governor, in his campaign speeches, declared he favored "a liberal" enforcement of the prohibition amendment, and that if elected, he would use all the legal machinery at his command to make the state wet.

Newton A. E. Bugbee, state comptroller, the Republican nominee, who in his speeches said the question was a federal and not a state issue, was supported by the prohibition forces.

Another question that aroused wide interest was the woman suffrage amendment—the Republicans favoring submitting it to the legislature for adoption or rejection, while the Democrats called for immediate ratification.


## SHORTAGE OF PRINT PAPER
