

AMERICANS DELAY SAILING

Delegation to Peace Conference Will Not Sail December 6

OUT OF DEFERENCE TO FRENCH REQUEST

Considerable Part of Personnel of Peace Mission Will Sail

Paris, Dec. 2.—The American delegation to the peace conference which was to have sailed from Brest for the United States on Dec. 6, has postponed its departure for home, it was learned this afternoon.

A considerable part of the personnel of the peace mission, however, will leave Paris for Brest on the evening of Dec. 5, as previously arranged.

It is learned from a high authority that the change in the plans of the delegation is due to the failure of the Germans to sign the protocol relating to the peace treaty.

It is pointed out that if the treaty is not ratified the situation between Germany and the United States, as well as the other allied and associated powers, goes back to the status created by the armistice.

Hence the United States is still quite as much interested as its associates of the allied powers, despite the fact that the Senate has not ratified the treaty.

Whatever the date which the American delegation may decide upon for leaving France, it was affirmed to-day on excellent authority, that such arrangement will be made for the representation of the United States in the further negotiations that Germany will find all the allied and associated powers working together to resist any effort on her part to avoid making the peace effective, according to the terms of the treaty.

MILITARY PATROLS TO LEAVE BOSTON

The City's Own Police Force Is Expected to Take Charge Next Monday for First Time in Three Months.

Boston, Dec. 2.—Plans for placing the city under the sole control of the police department next Monday were announced to-day. State guard officers expected that the last units of the military force brought here when union policemen struck on Sept. 9 would be relieved within the next few days.

Less than 500 guardsmen are now on duty and most of these are acting as traffic officers or are being held as a reserve unit.

Recruiting for the police department stopped two weeks ago, when it was announced that more than 1,200 applicants had been accepted.

The new department is largely composed of former service men and it is the youngest force in the country, police officials say.

NON-ESSENTIALS REFUSED COAL

Among Those Included Under Garfield's Order Were Stone Plants

THEATRES, MOVIES, FACE SHUTDOWNS

No Actual Suffering Has Thus Far Been Reported Over United States

Chicago, Dec. 2.—Restrictions on the use of coal already put into effect by regional coal committees, where the pinch of necessity had been felt, to-day were extended throughout the nation under an order of the federal fuel administrator.

The most extensive shutdown of industry in history was in prospect and domestic consumers were preparing to endure privation and discomfort as the strike of bituminous miners entered its second month.

Only in Kansas, where volunteers worked in the strip pits under protection of state and federal troops, and in the New River fields of West Virginia was there prospect to-day of increased production. In the former, seven pits were worked and in West Virginia operators said normal production was in sight by the end of the week.

Throughout the remainder of the country, however, miners apparently remained steadfast in their determination not to return to work under the 14 per cent wage increase ordered by the federal government and acceded to by the operators.

In Wyoming new labor troubles threatened to decrease the small amount of coal being brought out. Except for brief shutdowns at the beginning of the strike and twice since, the mines in that state generally had maintained operation.

Members of the railroad brotherhoods in Kansas to-day were expected to act on a resolution adopted last night to request authority to refuse to handle coal mined by non-union workers.

Under the sweeping order of Fuel Administrator Garfield, limiting delivery of fuel or power only to essential consumers in the first five classes of the war priorities list, curtailment of production was in prospect in factories turning out boots and shoes, brass and bronze manufacturers, clothing, machinery (except where specifically exempted), iron and steel, jewelry, marble and stone products, musical instruments, paper goods (newsprint excepted), rubbers, woods, cigars, wagons and carriages, wood manufacturers, sheet and metal products, leather goods, mattresses, paints and varnishes, photographic supplies and miscellaneous non-essentials.

Theatres, motion picture shows and all other places of amusement faced complete shutdown. Churches and schools also were included in that category, although efforts were being made to postpone closing the schools as long as possible.

Bakeries, except those producing only bread, also fell under the ban, as did confectioners and certain packing plants.

In some of these industries, however, an immediate shutdown may be forestalled if the regional coal committees permit them to operate until their present supply of fuel is exhausted.

Despite low temperatures that have spread over the west for the last few days but little actual suffering because of the fuel shortage had been reported.

Suspension of all traffic over the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad lines out of Oklahoma City was said to be only a matter of hours unless coal were supplied. All railroad traffic might be shut out of Oklahoma City by the end of the week, railroad officials there said.

In Indiana, state officials expressed the hope that enough coal could be mined immediately to furnish state institutions with fuel.

FOR STRIKE EMERGENCY. Washington, D. C., Dec. 2.—War-time restrictions on the consumption of coal were ordered into effect yesterday for the period of present strike emergency.

Fuel Administrator Garfield, acting in conjunction with the railroad administration, announced that only the industries included in the first five classes of the priority list established during the war would be furnished coal and that public utilities would be asked to discontinue furnishing power heat and light to non-essential industries.

The industries to which coal will be furnished will be railroad shipping, army and navy and other government departments, state and county departments, and institutions; public utilities including newspapers and retail dealers supplying household consumers.

State and local authorities, Dr. Garfield said, will be asked to co-operate, though the rationing of coal will be done through the regional coal commission set up by the railroad administration.

BAN JOHNSON SAYS HE'S FOLLOWING PRECEDENT

In Holding Annual Meeting of American League Club Owners in Chicago.

Chicago, Dec. 2.—In calling the annual meeting of American league club owners for Chicago, President B. Ban Johnson only followed precedent, according to a statement made public here to-day. Mr. Johnson was commenting on the injunction proceedings begun by the Comiskey-Frazer-Ruppert faction to prevent him calling the meeting here and looking toward holding it in New York.

"Before issuing the call for the annual meeting I consulted the club owners and five of them favored Chicago," Mr. Johnson continued. "Our annual meeting has been held here continuously since 1912, and always has been called by the president of the league. The constitution fixes the time but does not name the place. It does not confer authority to issue the call on either the president or directors, but I have always done so after determining the wishes of the majority of the club owners."

Why the three majority directors, Charles A. Comiskey of Chicago, H. H. Frazer of Boston and Jacob Ruppert of New York, should wish to hold the meeting in New York, Mr. Johnson said he could not understand. Besides being convenient to hold the meeting here, where the league offices are, free access to various papers, documents and records of the league which the directors had expressed a wish to see would be had, according to the league executive.

FOURTEEN TEAMS STILL TIED.

Had Covered 641 Miles and Five Laps in Six-Day Bike Race.

New York, Dec. 2.—Fourteen teams in the six-day bike race at Madison Square Garden were still tied at 8 o'clock this morning, the 32d hour. They had covered 641 miles and five laps at that time. The French-Belgian team of Chardon and Tiberghien had fallen one lap behind the others, who were led by Drobuch of the Boston team. The record for the 32d hour is 706 miles and one lap, made by Lawson and Root in 1915.
