Before an audience of more than 500 people, the Sunday school of the Methodist church gave a most pleasing entertainment last evening. Singing, exercises and recitations made up a program lasting nearly two hours and delighted the hearers with every number so that several times applause was heard and with every number a rattle was heard, indicating the pleasure of the audience. The program opened with a chorus of about 60 tots and juniors of the Sunday school, followed by a prayer by Rev. B. G. Lipsky. A very entertaining program of about 25 numbers by the youngsters of the Sunday school which followed showed the work of patient teaching of the parts, which here it may be said can be credited to Mrs. Earl Batchelder, who was assisted in producing the music by Mrs. Hudson Lawson of Montpelier. At the end of the program an offering usually received at the annual pre-Christmas entertainment was taken, following a short talk by the pastor of the church. The tidy sum received will be used for relief and uplift work in the United States and for missionary and enlightenment in foreign countries. Last evening many white gifts were received and on Wednesday of this week they will be distributed to the societies, which will place them in the hands of those who are needy.

One of the most beautiful services ever held and one which gave extreme enjoyment was the Christmas exercises and pageant in the Presbyterian church last evening. A special Christmas sermon delivered by the pastor, Rev. William McN. Kittredge, in the morning, together with special Christmas music, was heard by many. The first part of the evening was given over to songs and recitations by the Sunday school department and the little ones surely did their part well. The pageant told the story of the Nativity by song and word and was pronounced to be one of the best of its kind seen in the city. A large hidden choir took a prominent part in the entertainment. The decorations were pleasing to the eye and came in for no little commendation. The usual "White Gift" service came at the close of the pageant. In value the amount given to various causes amounted to \$100. The distribution was as follows: Armenia and Syria relief, \$31.75; Belgian relief, \$2.84; foreign missions, \$3.01; Sunday school work, \$18.10; to be turned over to the local welfare worker, Miss Gridley, \$7.76, and a large amount of valuable clothing, food and other miscellaneous articles. During the service George Young was the recipient of a gift presented by Alex Cordiner on behalf of the Sunday school which has been served so well for many years by Mr. Young, who only recently resigned. Children and the older ones entered cheerfully into the spirit of the occasion and the response was highly gratifying to the church officials. Much credit for the success of the program goes to Mrs. Kittredge and Mrs. J. V. Laing, who had the training of the children in hand. A Christmas social for the primary and junior departments will be held at the church Friday night at 7 o'clock.

The North Star is an eight-page paper well filled with reading matter and the customary small advertisements of that day. Among the advertisements is that of Joseph Arcey, jr., of Cabot, who announces that he will sell women's shoes for 60c to \$1 and men's boots from \$2 to \$3. But if those prices are low in comparison with present prices, there is one other difference in the charges for tea, for tea of the black variety sold for 35c a pound and of the green variety for 54c. The North Star was published by Nathaniel H. Eaton and bears as a sub-heading, "Where Liberty Dwells There Is My Country." The copy in Mrs. Dupaw's possession bears the date of March 16, 1816, and is No. 12 of volume 49.


