STAYED IN AIR 24 HOURS. French Airplane Goliath, Broke the World's Record.

Paris, June 4.—The airplane Goliath, piloted by Lieutenants Bossot and Bernard, broke the world's record for continuous flight to-day. The airplane was forced to discontinue its non-stop trial only after it had been in the air 24 hours, 19 minutes, seven seconds, covering a distance of 1,915 1/5 kilometres.

The Goliath also established what are claimed to be records for 1,000 and 1,500 kilometres, making the former in 11 hours, 29 minutes and 58 seconds, and the latter in 16 hours, 54 minutes and eight seconds.

The flight was made at Etampes, near Paris. The former record for continuous flight was held by the German, W. Landmann, who remained in the air 21 hours, 48 minutes, 40 seconds in June 1914.

MINISTRY OF LABOR. New Department in the Italian Government Decreed by King.

Rome, June 3.—King Victor Emmanuel to-day signed a decree creating a ministry of labor and public welfare. Signor Abbiati, minister of labor, will take charge of the new department.

MONTPELIER

The last issue of the Montpelier seminary Bulletin announces the election of Rev. George Redding of Montpelier and Rev. George Martin of St. Johnsbury as members of the board of trustees of the school. These have occurred since the Methodist conference was held. The statement reads as follows: "Rev. George A. Martin, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church in St. Johnsbury, has been elected to the board of trustees to succeed Rev. William Shaw, Ph. D. He was born in Guilford, Me., and prepared for college at the East Maine Conference seminary at Bucksport, graduating from Colby college with the degree of bachelor of arts. He held two notable pastorates before coming to St. Johnsbury. The first was at Rumford, Me.; the second at Grace church, Bangor, Me. He was for several years a trustee of the seminary from which he graduated. Mr. Martin is an exceptionally strong man, who will render valuable service to the seminary. Rev. George H. Redding comes to us as pastor of Trinity church and as trustee to succeed Dr. Wesley G. Mead. He was born and educated in Indiana, following his attendance at Taylor university, was for 12 years in educational work. In 1902 he entered the ministry, being first associated with the North Indiana conference. At one time he served as pastor of an institutional church at Yorktown, Indiana. Since entering the Vermont conference he has held pastorates at Hardwick and Northfield.

SINN FEIN SECURE MORE POWER

Won Election in County Tyrone in Ireland—Various Election Tricks Were Revived.

Belfast, Ireland, June 4.—As a result of county and district council elections, the Sinn Fein Nationalist Alliance has won control in County Tyrone for the first time. In addition it has maintained its hold on County Fermanagh by a majority of 559.

Keenest interest was taken in these elections because both counties are included within the Ulster area outlined in the Irish bill now before the British Parliament. Various election tricks were revived, one woman disguising herself and voting as her own mother. Another woman is said to have voted seven times. The failure of the elections generally in northern Ireland was due to the ascendancy gained by the Sinn Feiners over the followers of Redmond.

ITALY WANTS MORE.

Believes Its Share of Reparations Insufficient. Paris, June 4.—Premier Nitti believes that Italy's share in the indemnity to be paid by Germany, as fixed by the peace treaty, is insufficient as Italy did not participate in the distribution of German colonies or in warships which were surrendered, says the Paris Star. He has been in conference with Signor Bertolini, chief of the Italian delegation on the reparations commission, relative to a revision of the terms.

AUSTRALIANS PROTEST.

Against the Removal of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance. London, June 4.—Renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance is being sharply criticized by the Australian press, says a Melbourne dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company. It is suggested that the terms of the alliance should include a proviso which would prevent Great Britain from being dragged into a possible war between China and Japan, and newspapers there are insisting upon the right of Australians to control domestic legislation.

TURNED IN GOOD SCORE.

Walter Hagan Had a 75 on Addington, Eng., Golf Course.

Croydon, Eng., June 4.—The American professional golfers, Walter Hagan and Jim Barnes, who will compete in the English open golf championship, had their first regular practice in the Addington course here yesterday. Two four-ball matches were played, in which Barnes paired with Ross, the English professional, while Hagan had McRoome of the Oxford-Cambridge golfing society as a partner. Barnes and Ross won the forenoon round three up and two to play, while the afternoon match ended all square. The Americans made a much better showing during the afternoon, having familiarized themselves with the course on the earlier rounds. This was particularly true of Hagan who turned in a score of 75 for the afternoon round.

LOUISIANA MAY BE 36TH STATE.

Committee Unanimously Reports Out Resolution of Ratification. Baton Rouge, La., June 4.—By unanimous vote the Senate federal resolutions committee reported out a resolution providing for ratification of the federal suffrage amendment. The House Wednesday adopted a proposed amendment to the state constitution giving women the right of suffrage.
