### ESPERANTO IS BEING GROOMED

Capt. "Marty" Welch and Crew Getting Schooner Ready for Race

TWO OF THE SAILS BEING CHANGED

All Other Defects Being Remedied for Saturday's Race

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 28.—Captain "Marty" Welch and his crew met the dawn to-day grooming the Gloucester fishing schooner Esperanto for her 40-mile race with the pride of the Nova Scotia fleet, the Delawana, off Halifax harbor on Saturday.

Everything unnecessary aboard the craft is being sent ashore. Two of the sails which did not work satisfactorily on the run down from Gloucester are being removed, and other slight changes being made in the rigging. With the first favorable breath of wind, Captain Welch proposes to take the Esperanto out for a trial spin and if possible he will go over the entire course. The Delawana is nearing completion for the contest and, when some slight defects in the rudder are remedied, she will leave Lunenburg for Halifax, probably late to-day.
