Marriage at Somerset Hotel, Boston, of Interest Here.

The following account of the marriage of Miss Marian Vesta Bayley of Lexington, Mass., and Dr. Edwin Porter Buchanan of Pittsburgh, Pa., will be of interest not only to acquaintances in this place, since the bride's parents are both Newbury people, but also in other places in the state, as Mr. Bayley is also a member of the Vermont Historical society.

"One of the notable mid-October weddings, and one in which very many residents of Lexington were particularly interested, occurred on Saturday evening, the 16th instant, at the Somerset hotel, Boston, where, in the presence of a large gathering of relatives, intimate friends and acquaintances, Miss Marian Vesta Bayley, daughter and only child of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Allen Bayley of Oakland street, Lexington, was united in marriage with Dr. Edwin Porter Buchanan of Pittsburgh, Pa., the younger son of Dr. and Mrs. John J. Buchanan of that city. Their engagement was announced last March.

"The bride was born in Lexington, which has always been her home, and where she is widely known and highly esteemed by a large circle of friends; she prepared for college at the Emma Willard school in Troy, N. Y., and entered Smith in the class of '19, where she remained two years; subsequently she took special courses for two years at Radcliffe.

"The groom was born in Pittsburgh, where he has always resided. He is a graduate of Princeton college of the class of '13, and of Harvard medical college of the class of '17; he served two years as lieutenant during the World war, one year of which was with the American Expeditionary force in France. He is now associated with his father in the practice of surgery in Pittsburgh.

"The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. Christopher W. Collier, pastor of the Hancock Congregational church, the single ring services being used. The parlor rooms of the Somerset were handsomely decorated with palms, pink chrysanthemums, roses and autumn leaves, and made a very attractive setting for such an occasion.

"The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, was beautifully gowned in ivory satin, trimmed with a court train, and trimmed with rose point lace; she wore a tulle veil fastened with a wreath of orange blossoms and carried a shower bouquet of lilies of the valley, gardenias and maiden hair ferns.

"The maid of honor, Miss Esther Katherine Nichols, a graduate of Southern college, of Cleveland, O., wore a handsome gown of shaded rose georgette crepe and carried an armful of pink roses.

"The bride's train bearers were her small cousins, Master Richard Morgan, five years old, and Master William Morgan, four years old, of Hartford, Conn., and the best man was John Grier Buchanan of Pittsburgh, brother of the groom. "An orchestra furnished music for the bridal march and for the reception and dancing which followed the ceremony. The entire occasion was particularly cordial and free from formality.
