"Immediately following the ceremony, which was performed in the presence of the immediate family, came the reception to about 150 guests, who were met at the door by Misses Ruth Marden and Nellie Holway, while Mrs. W. F. Greene acted as usher. In the receiving line were Mr. and Mrs. Phillips, Rev. and Mrs. Clark, Miss Clark and Mr. Huggard.

"Mrs. H. Haines, as mistress of ceremonies, ushered the guests into the dining room where ice cream, cake, fancy cookies and candy were served by Mrs. G. H. Viles, Mrs. Barbara Moore and Misses Helen Kenison, Alice Morse, Mary Prince and Mina Titus, all close friends of the bride.

Cecil Mason of Grantham, N. H., is staying for a while with his grandmother, Mrs. Alice Beard.





Winter Storage FOR YOUR BATTERY

Mr. Motorist: There Are Two Methods of Storing a Battery

You can put your car in winter storage and practically forget about it. But you cannot forget about your battery. It is an electro-chemical combination and must have special attention. This attention should be given by experts. Your battery can be stored with the electrolyte in it just as it was taken out of the car. This is called "Wet Storage." The battery must be kept in a dry place and at safe temperatures.

It must be watered and charged once a month. Vesta service stations will do this for you at a small fixed monthly cost.

The second and better method is to disassemble the battery. The plates are then stored dry; hence the name "Dry Storage." Chemical action is completely suspended so that the battery is ready to start a new cycle of life when reassembled. Its useful life is prolonged.

New separators must be used when the battery is re-assembled, so the dry storage method costs a little more than wet storage. But it is cheaper in the long run when you consider the months of battery wear that are saved.


