**DEMPSEY WILL
WEIGH UP TO 190**

A Difference of About 20 Pounds Between Him and Carpentier

WHEN THEY ENTER THE RING

Champion Will Not Put on the Gloves Before Saturday, This Week

Atlantic City, N. J., June 7.—There will be a difference in weight of about twenty pounds when Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier peel off their bath robes for the world's heavy-weight champion match in Jersey City July 2. Dempsey said today that he planned to scale exactly 190 pounds in the ring. If he succeeds in keeping his weight at that notch he will be three pounds heavier than he ever has weighed for a fight before. When he won the title from Jess Willard at Toledo two years ago, Dempsey scaled exactly 187 pounds. He weighed 185 pounds when he defeated Billy Miske at Benton Harbor, Mich., last Labor day, and 182 pounds when he met Bill Brennan in New York last winter.

"I am growing a bit and I am governing my weight accordingly," Dempsey said. "I think I will be at my best at 190 pounds, and will be able to box at top speed. Carpentier, I understand, will weigh about 170 pounds."

With the match less than four weeks away Dempsey today is within seven pounds of the weight he hopes to reach. The champion's legs are as thin as a lightweight's and he is taking long runs on the road every morning to keep any surplus weight off them. There is not much evidence of surplus weight around his mid-section, nor on his tremendous chest and back. Dempsey is a great believer in drinking plenty of water, which he says, enables him to perspire freely and quickly.

The champion did no boxing yesterday and probably will not put on the gloves until Saturday. He went through a fast workout, however. After a three-round session with the punching bag Dempsey shadow boxed, slugging away at the heavy sand bag and finished up with some vigorous bending exercises.

SPAULDING H. S. BASEBALL CHAMPION

Has Only Lost One High School Game This Season—Main Stay Has Been Good Pitching Staff.

By virtue of their victory over Montpelier high school at Lincoln campus Saturday afternoon the Spaulding high school baseball team lays claim to the state high school baseball championship. The claim is based on a superior record to any other high school team in the state. So far Spaulding has only lost one high school game and that to St. Albans 4 to 3 in a 13-inning contest. Until the eighth inning of that game it looked like a sure victory for the Barre boys. At that time Spaulding was leading by the score of 3 to 0 when St. Albans came through and tied the score with three runs in one frame. One week ago last Saturday St. Albans came to Barre for the second game and lost in a hotly contested game by the score of 6 to 5.

This was St. Albans' first loss of the season but since then they have dropped a game to Burlington high school at Burlington, 6 to 3. Cathedral high school of Burlington, another aspirant in northern Vermont, was put out of the running when they were beaten twice by Spaulding and once at St. Albans. St. Albans will play Cathedral at Burlington next Monday. Ever since their first defeat of the season to Spaulding Cathedral has been slumping. But at the time of their second meeting with the Barre team in Burlington, they showed some of the old "pep" and ought to make the railroad city lads work in order to win another victory. Rutland of the southern part of the state seems to be showing great opposition to what teams of the northern part of the state that they have met since they have lost twice to Cathedral and once to Burlington. Burlington high is a team that has been showing marked improvement within the last few weeks, and they have an aggregation that ought to win a great share of their remaining games. They got off to a poor start, however, which kills any hopes which they might have held for championship chances.

Spaulding completes its schedule today at Montpelier when they meet Montpelier seminary for the second time this year. With two defeats against them out of 15 regularly scheduled games, Spaulding holds the record of never being defeated by the same team twice, and having defeated two teams which have scored a victory over them. which came through with hits in pinches. Captain "Bobby" Nicora leads the hitting list with an average of .509. For pitching, O'Leary has won six games and lost none. Slayton has won four and lost two. Calagni gets credit for winning the Norwich freshmen game at Barre, although he only pitched seven innings, retiring in favor of O'Leary when Spaulding led. Slayton has been reserved for the hardest games and thus his record does not shine as brilliantly as it might under different conditions. O'Leary has been batted from the box once, at Burlington, against Burlington high school, but since Slayton took the box when Spaulding was leading, O'Leary gets credit for a win. At Barre, St. Albans got to Slayton and drove him from the slab. O'Leary took the box with the score against him and won. Woodcock pitching, the last three innings of the game against Montpelier high school last Saturday, showed good form, getting five strike-outs and allowing one hit.
