

Flowers Collected by One Barre School.
 The following different varieties of wild flowers have been brought to school this spring by the pupils of Miss Jordan's third grade at the Ward V school: Pussy willow, coltsfoot, Indian tobacco, horsetail, spring beauty, babies in woods, blue violet, yellow violet, white violet, dogtooth violet, Canadian mayflower, hepatics, red trillium, painted trillium, dutchman's breeches, adder tongue, blue kohosh, blue, jill-over-the-ground, strawberry, wild oata, cowslip, wild ginger, wild mustard, wild pepper, bishop's cap, bunchberry, shepherd's purse, jack-in-the-pulpit, banberry, false buttercup, ground nut, dandelion, chickweed, Canadian violet, elder, twisted stalk, Solomon's seal, columbine, gold thread, foam flower, white Jack-in-the-pulpit, Clintonia, buttercup, pasque flower, celandine, ginseng, chickory, painted daisy, sweet clover, lady's slipper, orange violet, red clover, white daisy, American blue, blue brooklime, evening primrose, Queen Anne's lace, raspberry, blackberry, kale, common marrow, moccasin flower, blue vetch, yellow pond lily, mountain sage, dogwood, sorrel, star flower, blood root, bellwort, paint brush, making 72 varieties. Blossoms of different trees brought were not included in the list.
 Twenty-eight different kinds of wild birds have been seen and identified by these children and their teacher. The list follows: Crow, robin, bluebird, red-winged blackbird, phoebe, kingfisher, wild duck, hen hawk, chickadee, song sparrow, chipping sparrow, downy woodpecker, barn swallow, chimney swift, cat bird, meadow lark, blue jay, bobolink, nuthatch, wild canary, house wren, thrush, flicker, yellow breasted chat, humming bird, purple martin, goldfinch, Baltimore Oriole.
