Happenings of interest from Different Sections.

Mrs. Sarah Aiken of Albany, aged 85 years, has woven 80 yards of rag carpet in the last few weeks.

Two Bellows Falls mills have resumed operations in the past week, after a shutdown of several months.

The Baptist church of North Springfield has extended a call to Rev. E. C. Weeks of Hartford, N. Y., to become its pastor.

J. S. Baker, president of the Richmond Underwear company of Richmond, died at Atlantic City, N. J., on Nov. 17. The funeral and burial was in Peekskill, N. Y.

A fine buck passed down River street in Brandon Wednesday and through several dooryards. Albert Blodgett, through whose yard the deer passed, was hunting elsewhere.

William McFarland of West Burke, in his 87th year, was one of the deer hunters of that section. O. D. Bacon of Newport, aged 79, also engaged in the same sport in Morrisville.

Rev. William H. Dean, 85 years old, died Wednesday at the home of his daughter in Middlebury. He was educated at Poutney academy, belonged to the Vermont conference and had held pastorates in St. Albans and other towns in the northern part of the state.

Out of a total of 29,075 farms in Vermont, 20,622 reported to the census bureau in 1920 that they had 166,388 calves raised, or 8.1 for every farm; 7,142 farms reported 98,022 pigs raised, or an average of 13.7; 1,954 farms reported 30,800 lambs raised, or an average of 15.8.

The Vermont Y. W. C. A. has purchased Camp Hochelaga, a girls' camp on Lake Champlain, and has taken a 20-year lease of the camp site. The Y. W. C. A. has operated a girls' camp here the past two summers. Miss Julia M. Thomas of New Haven, Conn., formerly of Rutland, will be the 1922 director, as last summer.

Cyril Johnson and Paul Easton of Claremont, N. H., who came to Townsend to hunt deer, secured a fine buck right in the village and were gone from their hotel not more than 15 minutes. They started out about the middle of the morning and had not left the village when, as they emerged from a bridge, they saw a buck standing in the middle of the road and an easy shot. The animal was secured and the hunters returned home.

Alexander McCoy of Proctor, while walking on the railroad track, was struck by a train Thursday. Mr. McCoy, who is deaf, evidently did not hear the train as it approached. He was knocked into the ditch and as soon as the train could be stopped the crew took him onto the train and to the Proctor hospital. A compound fracture of one arm seemed to be the extent of his injuries.

Valuation of West River R. R.

The valuation of the West River railroad has been fixed at \$450,000 by the railway appraisals board, consisting of Lieut. Gov. Abram W. Foote, Secretary of State Harry A. Black and State Treasurer Walter Scott. This is a line belonging to the Central Vermont, which entered a plea with the board for a lower appraisal than that for 1921, which was \$500,000. The board arrived at a decision on Thursday. The new low figure will be valid for 1922. The valuation of the West River road had already been reduced from \$576,000 in 1920 to an even half million in 1921. This road runs from Brattleboro to South Londonderry. The tax for next year at the new valuation will be \$6,625.

Obituary.

Mrs. James McGuigan, aged 54 years Aug. 1, 1921, died at Meredith, N. H., Nov. 6 at 8 p. m., after a long illness, which at the last proved to be a cancer of the intestines. She was born in St. Sylvester, P. Q., the daughter of John and Angelina (Cotta) Smith, her parents passing away when she was very young. She was then taken into the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Henry. They moved to Sherbrooke, P. Q., where Mr. Henry kept store for a number of years. From there they came to Lancaster, N. H., and it was there she was married by Rev. Father Sullivan at All Saints' church to James McGuigan from Prince Edward Island.

Mr. and Mrs. McGuigan then came to Barre to make their home. Two daughters were born to them here, Mary Ellen dying at three months and Mary Alice at three days. Leaving Barre, the family moved to Orange, where four children were born to them, Stanley, now 19 years of age, Edwin H., Theodore 17 and Beatrice 15, all surviving. They moved to West Topsham 14 years ago, going last summer to Meredith, N. H., where they had since made their home.

The body was taken to her brother's home at 65 Merrimack street, Laconia, N. H. Funeral services were held the next morning, Nov. 8, at 8 a. m. at St. Joseph church, high mass being conducted by Rev. Father O'Connell. Burial was made in St. Joseph's cemetery. Stanley and Edwin McGuigan, sons, John and Patsy Smith, nephews, acted as bearers.

Those who survive are Mr. McGuigan, her husband, and four children of Mrs. Meredith, N. H.; William Smith, a brother, and several nieces and nephews, besides distant relatives.

VERMONT WON DISTINCTION.

As State Having Fastest Growing Industries Organization.

L. A. Kelly, acting secretary of the Associated Industries of Vermont, Inc., has returned from New York where he attended the semi-annual meeting of the National Industrial Council held at the Hotel Pennsylvania with one representative from each of forty states that are identified with the council present. In some instances, two delegates were present. It was said to be the best session held in recent years.

Among the speakers were Dr. Takuma Dan, general managing director of the Combined Mitsui Interests, and chairman of the distinguished group of Japanese business leaders now visiting America, and Baron Kumakichi Nakashima, a member of the Japanese House of Peers and director of several of the principal Japanese banks and other public institutions; C. B. Hurry, identified with the department of revenue collection; E. S. Koehoberger who was identified with the drafting of the Smoot amendment; James A. Emery, counsel for the organization of Washington; Francis H. Sissons, vice-president of the Guaranty Trust company of New York; J. E. Edgerton president of the National Association of Manufacturers; F. G. Lourie, president of the Delaware and Hudson railroad system.

Among the prominent secretaries in the industrial work present were P. C. Thompson of Washington, J. H. MacIntosh of Idaho, Frederick Mosgel of California, C. C. O'Quinn of Kentucky, C. C. Gilbert of Tennessee.

A feature for Vermont was the final announcement in the conference that the state organization had been awarded a silver loving cup for the largest increase in membership since last May, a gain of 107 per cent; also the announcement that the state was awarded a filing case by a western manufacturer for the largest per cent in gain of membership.
