


At least one Barre firm employing skilled labor has taken the initiative in the reduction of living costs. The N. D. Phelps Co. Inc., announces today that on and after April 1, there will be a 15 per cent reduction in the charge for either plumbers' or steamfitters' labor, the cost of such labor with reduction in force being 85 cents an hour and with the use of automobile truck \$1.05. An equal reduction will be made in the workmen's wages at that time. As far as is known this is the first wage reduction to be put in force in the city.
