AN OLD CONDUCTOR.

George D. Tute Ran on Boston & Maine Over 30 Years.

St. Johnsbury, Oct. 4.—George Davis Tute, a Boston and Maine conductor in this section for more than 30 years, died Monday at Brightlook hospital following a long illness of Bright's disease. The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock at the Caldwell parlor. Rev. George W. Hyatt officiating and interment will be made at Lyndon Center. Mr. Tute's illness was a protracted one. He had been unable to attend to his railroad duties for more than a year and had been a patient at Brightlook the past four months.

Born in Derby December 21, 1865, the son of David and Eliza Tute, practically his whole life was spent in Lyndonville. His parents moved there when he was an infant, he was educated in the schools of Lyndonville and in early childhood chose a railroad career. For 32 years he was a conductor of the Boston and Maine running from Lyndonville to White River and from Lyndonville to Newport. All of these years with the exception of a short period in Wells River was spent in Lyndonville. He was a member of the Order of Railway Conductors, an obliging, painstaking official, whose score and a half of years as conductor was marked by conscientious service. Thirty-seven years ago Mr. Tute married Miss Annie Kittredge of Lyndon and she survives him with one son, Roland C. Tute of Wolf Point, Montana. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Tute, and Mrs. David Tute of Lyndonville, and three sisters, Mrs. Byron Carr of Marlboro, Mass., Mrs. Hiram Libby and Mrs. Herbert Leach of Lyndonville.

DR. ELMER PIKE NAMED.

As Medical Director of the University of Vermont.

Burlington, Oct. 4.—The latest addition to the faculty of the University of Vermont was made during the past week when Dr. Elmer Pike was appointed as medical director of the university. Dr. Pike will fill the position left vacant by Dr. David Marvin, the latter having served as medical director of the university for several years. He has also been a professor on the faculty of the college of medicine, and will continue to serve in that capacity. Dr. Elmer Pike entered the University of Vermont in 1910 as a student in the college of agriculture, changing his course a few years later to medicine. He graduated from the college of medicine in 1919, and since that time has practiced his profession in Sudbury, where in college he was prominent as an athlete and played four years chiefly as a first baseman on the baseball team. He has already arrived in this city, and will assume his duties immediately. The new medical director will be assisted by Luther Tarbell, who is now a sophomore in the college of medicine.

POLITICAL SENSATION.

Another Candidate for Sheriff Springs Up in Caledonia County.

St. Johnsbury, Oct. 4.—A sensation was sprung in the political field yesterday by the certification on the November ballot of Byron M. Bundy of Sutton as a candidate for high sheriff. Mr. Bundy although a Republican will have to be certified as an Independent candidate as Fred Flint is the duly accredited nominee of the Republican party on the ballot.

The three candidates to appear on the ticket for high sheriff will be Fred D. Flint, Republican; John B. Finley, Democrat; Byron M. Bundy, Independent.

Mr. Bundy is a resident of the town of Sutton, as had 12 years' actual experience as deputy sheriff and familiar with the duties attending the office of sheriff. He has held various town offices and represented his town in the legislature of 1910.

For the past several weeks he has been assigned as one of the officers protecting railroad property at Lyndonville. He is 49 years old, married and has three children.

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS BUREAU

Starts on New Year of Usefulness—Located at Norwich University.

The educational experiment tried out by Norwich university in the establishment of a bureau of municipal affairs last year has ceased to be an experiment, having demonstrated the reason for its being and having proved its worth to the general public.

The bureau was established in November, 1921, with the primary purpose of rendering service to the communities of Vermont by:

(a) Giving information upon request regarding community organization, town planning and the administration of local government.

(b) Publishing bulletins dealing with problems of government which are of current interest and distributing them to municipal officers, civic organizations and libraries.

(c) Encouraging the establishment of local town reference bureaus.

(d) Providing communities with speakers or governmental topics.

(e) Holding local government conferences.

The bureau is conducted and operated under the supervision of Professor K. R. B. Flint of the department of political science, who is well known as an authority in all matters covered by the activities of the bureau.

Since it was established a number of local municipal reference bureaus have affiliated themselves and been established in the public libraries of Vermont. A large number of calls for assistance in the solution of municipal problems have been received from villages and municipalities in Vermont and elsewhere, and the bureau has been able to supply the needed information.

Professor Flint as director of the bureau has spoken on various phases of municipal government in a dozen or more Vermont communities and has been called as an expert on such matters into Massachusetts, New York and New Hampshire. A second edition of his bulletin on town planning has been published and has been distributed to the municipalities within the state. The first edition was exhausted some time ago, calls for it coming from as far afield as Australia. The bureau seems to fill a long felt want, and has proved a worth while extension of educational opportunities and privileges.

TEN NEW TEACHERS.

On Faculty of Middlebury College This Year.

Middlebury, Oct. 4.—The year at Middlebury college finds ten new teachers on the faculty and two regular professors back after a year's leave of absence. M. ene Hadre is filling the vacancy in the French department caused by the appointment of Prof. Duane L. Robinson to the duties of secretary of the faculty. Miss Marie Bideaud, who served as instructor during this summer session of the French school, is remaining a regular faculty member. Senor Primitivo R. Sanjurjo and Senorita Milagros de Alda have been attached to the Spanish department to fill vacancies caused by resignations.
