



Sausage Dressing for the Thanksgiving Turkey

Brown has had so much of his time taken up by the routine work of his physical education course that the squad has suffered from lack of attention.

A heavy schedule has been arranged this season and practice is being held five times a week in preparation. Coach Smith has divided the squad into two parts for practice purposes in order to enable more individual attention. The session opens with the game with Dartmouth at Hanover Dec. 8.

TO TIME CLOSER.

Watches Timed to Tenth of a Second to Be Used.

New York, Nov. 24.—Watches timing to a tenth of a second will be used in the inter-collegiate cross-country championship race at Van Cortlandt park Monday and, if successful, their adoption officially by the Amateur Athletic union for all track meets is regarded as likely.

The new watches, replacing those timing to but a fifth of a second, have attracted unusual interest because of alleged timing discrepancies which caused the A. A. U. recently to withhold recognition of seven performances claimed as world's records by Charles Paddock, Los Angeles sprinter. Paddock asserted that stop watches registering only fifths of a second were inadequate.

The new watches have been adopted officially by the Intercollegiate A. A. U.

DIED OF OVER-EXERTION.

18-Year-Old Boxer Got Severe Blow Over Heart.

Carthage, Mo., Nov. 24.—Charles Parsons, 18, boxed a six-round bout with Johnnie Hughes of Picher, Okla., as a part of a program before the National Guard Athletic association last night and at the end of the bout he shook hands with his opponent and left the ring. An hour later he died.

WILLARD OFFERED \$30,000.

To Fight Floyd Johnson in Buffalo In January.

Los Angeles, Nov. 24.—Jess Willard, former heavyweight boxing champion, has received an offer of \$30,000 from Charles Murray, boxing promoter of Buffalo, N. Y., to meet Floyd Johnson in that city the latter part of January, according to Gene Doyle, Willard's local representative. Willard has taken the matter under advisement, Doyle said.

On Arrival in Boston for Game with Brown.

Easton, Nov. 24.—The big Green eleven, which arrived here from Hanover, N. H., last night to be ready for Brown tomorrow, prepared to go through a light signal drill to-day. This was to be followed by kicking practice.

Four New World's Records Made With Bosch.

Ralph Hepburn, motorcycle racing marvel, shattered four world's records in the motorcycle classic held on the one-mile dirt track at San Luis Obispo on Sunday, Nov. 5. The former records for the 1-, 5-, 10- and 25-mile distances were not simply clipped by fractions of seconds, but by substantial margins according to Mr. Mower of Harvey & Mower, the official Bosch service station in this city.

Ralph Hepburn's time for the one-mile was 29 6-10 seconds, when the best previous record was 42 4-10 seconds, made by Gene Walker on an Indian.

Hepburn's time in the five-mile event was three minutes, 26 6-10 seconds, the best previous record being made by Gene Walker, who drove his Indian over the same distance in three minutes and 38 seconds.

In the 10-mile event Hepburn finished in six minutes, 58 8-10 seconds, more than one and one-half minutes less than the best previous time, made when Gene Walker drove his machine

REFUSES TO SEE PRISON DOCTOR

Mary MacSwiney Also Declines Ministration of Prison Nurses

CARED FOR BY HER FELLOW PRISONERS

Annie, Her Sister, Fasting Outside, Is Carried by Friends to Hospital

Dublin, Nov. 24. (By the Associated Press).—Miss Annie MacSwiney, who had fasted outside the gates of Mount Joy prison since last Friday as a protest against the imprisonment of her sister, Mary, was removed by friends last evening to a private nursing home. She was in a very weak condition, but refused to take food and only swallowed some water.

In a letter to the newspapers, Mary MacSwiney, who has been on a hunger strike for twenty days, says that her sister received the sacrament on Wednesday and was given extreme unction.

Mary now refuses visits from the prison doctors and nurses. She is attended day and night by her fellow prisoners.

The world's record for the 25-mile event was held by Fred Ludlow, who covered the distance in 19 minutes, 17 6-10 seconds. Ralph Hepburn clipped one and one-fourth minutes from this record, when he rode 25 miles in 18 minutes and two seconds.

DR. STILL DIED SHOWING GUN

President of the American School of Osteopathy Dropped Weapon

WIFE, PARENTS AND 35 GUESTS PRESENT

Coroner's Inquest Held Today at Kirksville, Mo.

Kirksville, Mo., Nov. 24.—His wife, parents and thirty-five guests at an entertainment at his home saw Dr. George A. Still, president of the American School of Osteopathy here and nationally known as an osteopath, accidentally killed last night when he accidentally dropped a pistol and a bullet from it penetrated his brain.

A coroner's inquest will be held today.

Dr. Still, sportsman and lover of the outdoors, had shown members of his party his shotgun and was exhibiting the mechanism of a recently purchased pistol when the accident occurred.

ARMY HAS GIANT LINE.

Five of Regulars Stand Six Feet or More.

Philadelphia, Nov. 24.—The United States Naval academy football squad was expected to arrive here from Annapolis on a special train about noon today for the game with West Point on Franklin field to-morrow. The midshipman, led by Lieutenant Commander Douglas Howard, athletic director, and Bob Folwell, head coach, were to have a light practice on Franklin field.

Major Charles Daly, chaplain of his army squad into the city yesterday and ran through a snappy signal drill. The army team is one of the heaviest West Point ever has had, averaging about 182½ pounds. Five of the line regulars stand six feet or more.

Coach Daly planned to give his men another practice to-day—just enough, he said, "to keep the boys on edge."

Among those who were expected to arrive to-day for to-morrow's game were Secretary of Navy Denby, Mrs. Denby and their son, Edward Denby, Jr., Secretary of War Weeks and General Pershing.

The University of Pennsylvania board of trustees will give a luncheon before the game to-morrow to high dignitaries of the two academies and other distinguished visitors.

FORTY PLAYERS ON SQUAD

Taken By Naval Academy to Play the Army.

Annapolis, Md., Nov. 24.—The United States Naval academy football team and its staff of coaches, led by head coach "Bob" Folwell, left for Philadelphia this morning prepared to do battle against the West Point Cadets in their annual clash Saturday. Forty players and 20 coaches and assistants make up the party, which is in charge of Lieutenant B. F. Perry, a former gridiron star. The team will be quartered at the Bellevue Stratford hotel.
