

CHANCE SIGNS UP OVERALL

New Manager of Boston Americans Gets Old Chicago Pitcher

TO HAVE CHARGE OF YOUNG BOXMEN

Chance Failed to Get Services of Evers From Chicago Americans

Los Angeles, Dec. 12.—Frank Leroy Chance, who will manage the Boston club of the American league, before leaving Los Angeles recently for the east, signed Orville Overall, formerly a pitcher for the Chicago Nationals, to become his assistant in the Red Sox management, according to statements published here.

Overall will coach the young pitchers. Chance, it was said, also tried to obtain the services of Evers, but the latter could not obtain his release from the Chicago Americans.

STRIKE CASE NEARS END.

Five Men Indicted for Assault and Battery in Vintondale, Pa.

Ebensburg, Pa., Dec. 12.—Arthur Garfield Hayes of New York City, counsel for the American Civil Liberties union, was the principal witness in the trial of five men indicted for assault and battery when Mr. Hayes was arrested in Vintondale, Pa., while attempting to hold a public meeting during the coal strike last spring. The case is expected to reach the jury today.

The defendants are: L. I. Arbogast, an official of the Vinton Colliery company; Richard Esiais, Harry McAule, John Detulla and James Dempsey, company mine guards.

TO CULTIVATE GOOD WILL.

All That Is Left to the Railroad Managements.

New York, Dec. 12.—The cultivation of the public good will is all that is left to railroad managements because all other prerogatives are vested in the interstate commerce commission, Gerrit Fort, vice-president of the Boston and Maine Railroad company, asserted last night before the American Association of Freight Traffic Officers.

The sale of transportation, the railroads' chief job a decade ago, no longer was left to the roads, he said.

FIRE FOLLOWS LYNCHING BEE

Only Negro Hotel in Streetman, Texas, Was Destroyed

GEORGE GAY, 25; SHOT TO DEATH

Circumstantial Evidence Only Connected Him With Attack

Streetman, Tex., Dec. 12.—Streetman was quiet to-day after wild excitement which attended the lynching yesterday of a negro man and the burning of the only negro hotel last night.

George Gay, 25, was shot to death by a mob after he had been accused of an attack on a white woman.

The hotel was burned last night. Cause of the fire is unknown. The mob which took Gay from the sheriff's party which was trying to get him to safety had dispersed before the fire broke out.

Circumstantial evidence only connected Gay with the crime, according to officers, as he never was identified by the young woman as her assailant.



GENERAL STREETER DEAD AT CONCORD

Prominent New Hampshire Attorney and Citizen Was Native of Vermont.

Concord, N. H., Dec. 12.—General Frank Sherwin Streeter, one of the best known lawyers in the state of New Hampshire and a former judge advocate general of the state, died late yesterday at his home here, after a long illness.

Born in East Charleston, Vt., Aug. 5, 1833, he was educated at St. Johnsbury academy, Bates college and Dartmouth college.

For many years he was general counsel for the Boston and Maine railroad, a position from which he retired in 1907.

A Republican, he was a member of the state legislature and represented New Hampshire at the Republican national convention of 1896. He was judge advocate general of New Hampshire in 1895-96, and from 1911 to 1915 was a member of the international joint commission on the Canada boundary question. He had been a trustee of Dartmouth college since 1892.

His widow, a son and a daughter survive.
