CHICAGO REVIEW.
Business in the Grain Center During Yesterday's Session.
CHICAGO, October 24.—In point of activity the volume of trading in wheat fell somewhat short of yesterday, and on the whole only a moderate business was transacted. The opening was strong, and 3/4c. higher than yesterday's closing, but later became weak and declined 1/4c., ruled quiet and closed 1/2c. lower for December, and 3/4c. lower for May than yesterday.

Only a moderate business was transacted this morning in corn, which was quoted as firm. A greater part of the session market opened firm, a trifle over closing prices of yesterday, was strong for a time, then eased off a little on realizing by local longs, ruled steady and closed a shade better than yesterday.

Oats were a shade firmer early. The volume of trading was only moderate and chiefly in December and May.

Trading in mess pork was only fairly active. November was in fair demand, and opened at 10c. decline, followed by a further reduction of 20c., but rallied again 17 1/2 @ 20c. and closed comparatively steady. January was offered rather liberally and ruled weak, prices declining 10 1/2 @ 12 1/2c. and closing quiet.

Lard was dull and weak. Prices declined 5 1/2 @ 10c. per hundred pounds, and the market closed quiet at inside figures.

Short ribs were not very active. Prices ruled 2 1/2 @ 5c. lower and the market closed tame.

But there was very little buying except to cover contracts, and at an advance. The buyers were free sellers for a decline, however, came to the front, as one of the most active months. The tide of speculation in grain discourages the bulls in cotton. Spot was dull.
