Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 16.—There will be no preliminary hearing in the case of Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenck, charged with attempting to poison her husband, John Schenck, and the famous case will have its first airing before the special session of the grand jury, fixed for Friday, to take up the matter.

Methodist Conference in Session.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Nov. 16.—The Rev. Eugene B. Hendrix presiding the annual conference of the Western Carolina Methodist Episcopal church, South, convened here today, a distinguished representation of clerical and lay delegates from every charge of the conference being present.

Only one session was held today this being largely devoted to the announcement of committees, introduction of visitors to the conference and reception of communications and reports. Rev. W. L. Sherrill, who has been secretary of the conference for sixteen years was again chosen for this position, Harold Turner being named as assistant secretary and J. F. Kiry as statistical clerk.

Will Not Annex Panama.

Panama, Nov. 16.—President Taft tonight effectually disposed of the report that the United States was likely to annex Panama. At a dinner given in his honor by President Arosmena, and attended by two hundred prominent officials, diplomats and merchants, President Taft aroused the greatest enthusiasm when he declared that the American people would feel utterly dishonored in annexing Panama, unless some conduct on the part of the Panama people left no other course. This contingency Mr. Taft was sure would never arise.

Pretty Young Woman is Said to be a Burglar.

Stamford, Conn., Nov. 17.—A comely young woman, who gives her name as Christian Peterson, of Brooklyn, is under arrest here, charged with having burglar's tools in her possession. Three locks, 18 skeleton keys and an assortment of jimmies and other devices were found in a handbag which she carried. The police hope through her arrest to clear up a series of daring burglaries, which have been committed in the fashionable residence section of Stamford since October.

When the police asked the prisoner why she had the keys and pick locks in her possession she said she made a fad of collecting the skeleton keys for several years, but had never used them unlawfully. She declared that she did not know the uses to which the three pick locks and other devices could be put.

"Inherent Dishonesty" is Plea for Prisoner.

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 17.—"Inherent dishonesty" was the plea made by Leroy Roush, of Pittsburg, when arraigned in court today to explain the charges of burglary and forgery made against him. Roush was arrested yesterday charged with trying to get another man's cash out of the savings bank and it is alleged he had forged the name of his employer to a check, and robbed the room of one of his friends.

"I remember nothing of the occasion," he told the recorder. "I was drinking. My grandfather, when drinking, would commit crimes unwittingly, and I have inherited the tendency to be dishonest when drinking."

The novel plea did not save him from being held for the grand jury.

Fatally Injured at Raleigh.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 16.—Mrs. A. H. Mooneyham, wife of a member of the mercantile corporation of Dobbin, Ferrel company here, and two negro women, both from Durham, were probably fatally injured this afternoon during the big flying machine-automobile meet.

A serious drawback to the party is that the average Democrat is a law unto himself and obeys his own law. In the recent election Col. Bryan acted in State matters to suit himself, like anti-Bryan Democrats did in the National campaigns when he tried to win a victory for Democracy but was prevented by many of his present day critics. As Col. Bryan and most of his critics appear to be in the same boat of inconsistency they will please not rock the boat." Is what the Wilmington Star thinks about the senseless effort to discredit Mr. Bryan.

And the editors referred to are not alone in the boat. There are some other democrats so-called, who have more stomachs than they have brains right along-side with them. While Mr. Bryan was not a candidate in the recent election, his policies were endorsed by an overwhelming majority everywhere.
