NEW YORK COTTON MARKET.

New York, July 6.—The cotton market opened steady at unchanged prices to a decline of 3 points, which was considered rather better than due on the cables. Offerings were light and after the call the market advanced slightly on bull support of the near months which sent August up a net gain of 8 points. July was neglected and later positions sold only 2 or 3 points over the closing figures of the previous day during the early session. Trading was quiet and buying by local professionals was restricted by apprehensions that the bulls were supporting August for the purpose of making a selling basis for later months. The market closed with prices net unchanged to four points lower.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

New York, July 6.—The cash reserve showing in the bank statement was from \$10,000,000 to over \$12,000,000 away from the preliminary estimates, the \$5,000,000 cash decrease comparing

with an expected increase of \$5,000,000 to over \$7,000,000. The loan item at the same time showed a contraction of \$10,814,800, the resulting scaling down of deposits helping to restrict the decline in surplus to \$1,653,625, but leaving for the item only \$856,250.

The loan showing, following a heavy contraction last week, makes it evident that corporations depended on the money market much less than usual to finance the semi-annual disbursements, having apparently accumulated cash for that purpose, which was placed temporarily in call loans and recalled for the purpose of payments. The clearing house banks still hold \$30,752,200 of government deposits, compared with \$31,275,200 last week, so that small progress has been made in meeting the requirement for return of government deposits to be made on July 10. No coherent explanation was offered of the huge discrepancy in the cash showing. The exhibit was not taken seriously as a reliable showing of the actual operations of the week. The stock market practically ignored it, placing more reliance on the downward tendency of call money rates as an index of conditions. The notable strength of foreign markets was ignored in the stock market, although it was believed to point unmistakably to a resumption of gold exports next week. Amalgamated Copper was the market leader. The whole market rose substantially and closed active and buoyant. Total sales of bonds par value \$626,000. Total sales today \$31,300 shares.

NEW YORK DRY GOODS.

New York, July 6.—The dry goods market was very firm at the close today. Cotton goods have been further advanced. Many lines of men's wear and dress goods will be opened on Monday. Raw silk and jewelry are materially lower, with a downward tendency.

NEW ORLEANS MARKET.

New Orleans, July 6.—The cotton spot market was merely nominal. Prices were unchanged; middling 13 1/8; sales were 10 bales on the spot, with none to arrive. Continuance of the heated spell in Texas, somewhat offset by a not particularly inspiring foreign market, caused steady feeling with active months showing an advance of 1 point over yesterday's close. There was early buying on the dry weather report in Texas, but the temporary cessation of interest that the week-end usually brings became very much in evidence. There were no developments, however, which would have effected the market to any great extent either way and the close, which was steady, found the active months ranging from 2 to 3 points above the close yesterday.
