Lessons for the Negro to Learn. Norfolk Virginia-Pilot. Booker Washington opines that "the negro people here will not progress if they learn to save money. Yes; and in order to skin the rabbit, they must first catch it. More attention to crops and less to craps; more thought of work and less of idleness; attention to the fact that the day of labor is necessary to make Sunday one of rest; more regard for a contract than a possessive track; industry, self-denial, temperance. In short, the negro will thrive by observance of the same rules which bring success to the white man. So long as idleness, vagrancy and immorality are characteristic of a large proportion of the race, the worthless elements will neutralize the efforts of the better classes toward advancement. The measure of salvation attainable by the negroes must be sought through the sweat of their brows. The thoroughness of present opportunity must be met as it has been met in all ages by a degree of effort fitted to the difficulties to be overcome. There is no permanent place in the hive of human industry except for the makers of honey."

Would Make 'Em Bawl. Stateville Landmark. The editor of the New Bern Journal is evidently one of the Morally Stunted. Anyway he's trying to defeat prohibition. Hear him: "What more fitting opportunity than on the 26th of May to make the election doubly moral, for every voter for prohibition, who has not done so, to sign the temperance pledge. Let the temperance people have at every voting precinct in North Carolina pledges to be signed by each voter as he casts his vote for State prohibition. The moral effect of this would be incalculable. It would be a double binding force. It would be a ballot declaration against the liquor traffic, sustained by the pledge to Almighty God that every voter would live prohibition—and so there would be temperance in North Carolina that means morality. Well, doesn't that jar you? The Journal editor is trying to muddy the waters. He evidently knows that car loads of people who vote for prohibition will do so with a mental reservation to take up the opportunity offered. On one occasion a victim of the drink habit who had almost reached the limit was urged by his friends to take a whiskey cure. He refused. He had heard, he said, that if one took the cure and ever again took a drink death would be his. He proposed to take a pledge to himself in any such fashion. So with many of the prohibition voters. They'll vote for prohibition, but to ask them to pledge themselves never, no never, to take another drink—why, that's beyond reason."

The Prohibition Bill. Randleman Central North Carolinian. The Carolinian yields to none in loyalty to the cause of temperance, and it is of the opinion that temperance law is best promoted through the creation of healthy sentiment against intemperance through the teachings of the churches and in the home, by lesson and example, aided by wholesome local option laws, such as we now have on the statute books of the State, rather than through the enactment of prohibition laws, such as the prohibition bill passed by the recent special session of the Legislature. Men cannot be legislated into righteousness deeds. If we are to improve the morals of our people and make our citizens more temperate, let the virtues of temperance be proclaimed in the churches and above all let it be enforced in the family, that parents both by word and example may inculcate in their children both temporal and spiritual which spring from a life of temperance and sobriety. The question of temperance has long been up to the various towns, cities and communities throughout the States. They keep saloons if they want them, and they have the privilege of voting them out if they do not want them under present laws. The question is: What would be fair? Drinking is no longer popular as it has been in the past. The great world of business has set its seal of condemnation on the man who drinks. Corporations and business institutions turn him away, even the saloon keeper will not have him when he offers his services. The man who drinks is at a distinct discount in the industrial and business activities of the day.
