Suffocated Under Pile of Cotton Seed.

An unusual accident which resulted in death occurred at the cotton seed oil mills Monday night. George Wortham, a negro laborer, lost his life by being suffocated under a pile of cotton seed that fell on him. He was at work in the seed room and was last seen alive about half past eleven o'clock. Shortly thereafter it was noticed that seed ceased to pass up in the conveyors which it was Wortham's business to "feed." Upon investigation it was found that an immense pile of seed had fallen and spread out on the floor to the depth of five or six feet. As the man who had been working there was nowhere to be seen it was naturally supposed that he had been buried under the seed and efforts were begun to remove them as quickly as possible. It was fifteen or twenty minutes before the man could be dug out and he was when the body was recovered. He was lying on his back with his arms outstretched, an utterly helpless position to be in and it was impossible to extricate himself. When the mass of seed fell struck him and threw him backward or he might have escaped the terrible fate that he met.

Dr. Fenner, public health officer, was called but nothing could be done, life having been extinct too long. The body was removed to D. W. Hardee's undertaking rooms and Tuesday morning an inquest was held. An examination revealed the fact that there were no marks of violence and no evidence of foul play. Dr. Fenner, N. W. Willis, night engineer, and J. B. Ford, watchman at the mills were questioned by Coroner Hardee, their evidence being in effect as the facts above stated.

After viewing the body and hearing the evidence the verdict of the jury was substantially that the deceased, George Wortham, came to his death from accidental causes, being suffocated under a pile of cotton seed at the time and place and in a manner mentioned. Capt. B. F. Payne, Eugene Thorne, J. M. Bowling, Sam Fox, Eugene Falkner and Thad R. Manning constituted the jury of inquest.
