**SCOTT'S ANTARCTIC PARTY PERISHED**

WORLD IS SHOCKED AT DISASTER REPORTED TO SOUTH POLAR PARTY.

**NUMBER OF DEAD NOT KNOWN**

It is Believed That Sixty-Six Scientists and Sailors Were Lost.—How News of the Appalling Disaster Was Brought.

London.—News has just reached the world that Captain Robert F. Scott, the explorer, and an unknown number of his companions perished in the Antarctic while on their return journey from the South Pole.

They reached their goal on January 18, 1912, about a month after Captain Roland Amundsen, the Norwegian, had planted the flag of his country there. Then they turned back toward the bases they had formed on their outward journey, but were overtaken, overwhelmed and destroyed by a blizzard.

News of the death of the explorers was brought to civilization by the captain of the Terra Nova, the ship which had taken Scott's expedition to the South and which had gone again to bring them back after the accomplishment of their task.

A searching expedition recovered the bodies and records of the party. Only a few brief bulletins were sent from the New Zealand port of Oamaru by the captain of the Terra Nova, who related simply the fate of the party and then proceeded with his vessel for Lyttleton.

It is believed that the disaster did not involve all of the Scott party of sixty-six, but probably only Scott himself and the four others selected by him for the final dash to the pole. These are supposed to be Dr. E. A. Wilson, chief of the scientific staff; Captain L. E. G. Oates of the Innis Killin Dragoons; Lieut. H. R. Bowers of the Royal Indian marine, the commissioner officer, and Petty Officer E. Evans of the British Royal Navy, research in the Antarctic regions and had blazed the way for the discovery he ultimately made.

The expedition under Captain Scott was the best equipped that had ever been assembled for such an adventure. It sailed from Port Chalmers, near Christ Church, New Zealand, on Nov. 29, 1910. The Terra Nova made direct south into Ross sea. Early in January 1911, she forced her way into McMurdo Sound, where winter quarters were established on Cape Evans. The members of the expedition had a very arduous task in putting their stores on shore, and the work took a week. However, they were able to make themselves very comfortable there in houses which they had carried with them in "knock-down" form. They at once began their scientific observations.

Provisions for a three years' stay in the ice regions had been taken on board the Terra Nova and these were placed on shore.

Captain Scott had with him twenty Siberian ponies, thirty dogs and two motor sleds.

The ponies, dogs and motor sleds were to be used alternately for transport across the 1,500 miles between the landing place and the pole.

It was arranged to cover ten miles daily and it is apparent that this scheme was carried out up to the moment they reached the pole.

Captain Scott's main traveling party was to consist of sixteen men, besides himself, while groups of four men each were to return at different stages of the journey, leaving Scott and four others to complete the final dash to the Pole.

This would indicate that some of the members of the party who had been left at the various bases were not included among the victims of the disaster and that it was they who communicated to the world the fate of the expedition.

**The Terra Nova Bears Party.**

Christ Church, New Zealand.—The Antarctic steamer Terra Nova, which is supposed to have on board Captain Robert F. Scott and members of his South polar expedition, did not stop at Oamaru, but merely signalled. The Terra Nova is en route to Lyttleton. The date of Captain Scott's attainment of the South Pole, January 18, 1912, shows that he reached the goal of his expedition almost exactly one month after Capt. Roald Amundsen, the Norwegian explorer.

**Hot Fight Over Anti-Liquor Bill.**

Washington.—Strengthened by the passage of the Webb bill in the house friends of the Kenyon bill to prevent shipment of liquor into "dry" states were prepared for a sharp fight when the senate began its final consideration. The Kenyon bill was taken up under an agreement for a final vote. In form the measure is similar to the Webb bill, but the Kenyon bill includes one section to give state officials control over liquor shipments as soon as they come within the state borders.

**WOMEN THE RULERS**

THEIR POWER IN WASHINGTON SHOWN BY PLANS FOR THEIR GREAT PARADE.

**MANY HUSBANDS WILL MARCH**

Colored Cloaks and Soft Hats to Be Worn by the Suffragettes—Political Clubs Warned the Affair is Non-Partisan.

Washington.—Dispatches from Washington have told in part the story of the purpose of the women who are interested in suffrage that their big parade in this city, on March 3 shall prove to be not only an educational object lesson, but an affair of such commanding proportions, and of such attractive pictures that it will hold the attention not only of the visitors to the capital, but of the people of the entire nation.

Woman, although suffrage in full is not yet here, is ruler today in the capital of the nation. The committee of men which has charge of the plans for the Wilson inaugural ceremonies is the only Washington body which has not yet accepted completely the new order, and it is showing symptoms of surrender.

Washington has as many women's clubs as any other city in a country of the same population. It is said here that if a suffrage parade had been planned five years ago the proposal would have been condemned by a majority of the membership of every woman's club in town except the one organized for the promotion of equal rights. As it is now 90 per cent. of the women in all the clubs have shown their sympathy with the movement, and it seems to be virtually assured that every woman physically capable of marching is going to do it on March 3. Those who can get outdoors but cannot march are going to ride in automobiles, and those who cannot either march or get out of doors are giving their money to help the thing along.

**Congress Yields to Them.**

There has been further proof within a day or two that when woman wants anything congress gives it, or must be furnished with an exceedingly good excuse to get out of giving it. The Wilson inaugural plans were held up in congress until a committee of women was given a chance to try to prove to the lawmakers that while the parade of March 3 is to be an entirely non-partisan affair, it has every right to be considered as a part of the inauguration ceremonies. The women either wanted to use the grandstands which will be erected for the Wilson parade or they wanted permission to put up grand stands of their own. They won the first named concession.

The result of the present doing in Washington is certain to be the approval of the women of a plan to establish permanent suffrage headquarters in Washington for the purpose of keeping in touch with congress and supplying information to leaders throughout the states. The women want a change made in the constitution of the United States, and beginning on March 3 the suffrage campaigning will be national as well as local.

There have been at least a hundred meetings of women in Washington within the last week for the purpose of making preparations for the "great suffrage pageant." A score of these meetings have been public while the rest of them have been in a sense private, having been held in the homes of prominent club women. These home meetings have been attended by members of the various uplifting organizations. Thousands of women have signed marching pledges and sprinkled through the thousands of names are the names of men.

**Husbands to March Also.**

In some cases husbands are to march side by side with their wives, and it is hinted that some of these husbands will walk reluctant-footed. It may be that they approve of suffrage in a general way, but they are not enraptured with the thought of having their wives face the March winds and tramp through what is almost certain to be mud, snow or water. Moreover, some of these husbands, although their wives think they are capable of caring for themselves, are to insist on marching for "protective purposes."

Every marching woman will be given a cloak, or, rather, will buy one. There will be blue cloaks, gray cloaks, brown cloaks and possibly red cloaks, for the desire is to give a variety of color to the marching body. Soft hats will be worn by the women, which will be thrown back somewhat jauntily from the forehead. Now if it should turn out to be a balmy day, mere man, attending either as body guard or as a fervent believer in the rights of woman, will lift the cloak burden from woman and carry it over his arm, and therewith the procession will resolve itself into an unimportant affair.

Many political organizations of women have asked for places in the parade. Bull Moose, Republicans and Democrats have petitioned for assignment of places. The answer of the women's committee to each has been "come and march, but remember that this affair is to be strictly non-partisan and devoted wholly to the one cause of the advertisement of the rights of women."



to insure normal ripening with rapid sugar formation. The right kind of fertilizer is a good investment. The vines will continue to bear melons of first quality instead of yielding only one or two pickings and then a lot of unmarketable culls.

Supplement the compost with 2000 to 3000 pounds of 5-8-10 goods, the ammonia to be derived mainly from organic substances like blood, tankage, fish or cottonseed meal.

This is equally good for cucumbers, pumpkins and squashes.
