

Mrs. Charlotte Hunt Dead

Mrs. Charlotte Hunt died at her home at 507 Elm street last week after being confined to her bed for more than two years. Death came as a result of a stroke of apoplexy.

Mrs. Hunt was married to S. J. Hunt a number of years ago and they have lived in High Point for about 10 years. She was born in Dayid: o i county December 8, 1856, and was therefore 59 years, seven

months and seven days of age at the time of her death. The remains were shipped to Denton this morning and the funeral took place at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon at Tom Creek's church where the interment followed immediately.

Marooned Persons on No. 12 Tell Sad Story

A better insight into conditions existing in the Marion section has been brought to the city by passengers who worked their way through via Blacksburg, S. C., across the Catawba in boats and into Greensboro on train No. 46 Friday night. Among the party was Sherwood Brockwell, an employee of the state insurance department who had been to Marshall to address a teachers' institute Saturday. Rain poured in Marshall at times Saturday, and after making his talk, he caught train No. 12, getting as far as Marion, where he and about 200 others were marooned until they got out yesterday, by train over the line from Marion to Blacksburg.

Mr. Brockwell was formerly chief of the Raleigh fire department, and took training in New York. He tells an interesting story of the desolation in that section of the state. Marion was reached Saturday evening and the train pushed slowly forward to Nebo, but the little creeks had already assumed the proportions of great rivers. They succeeded in backing to Marion where the train stopped, together with another which was headed toward the mountains.

For the first day or so food on the diner about supplied the crowd but this gave out Tuesday. Not a word had come to them from outside, the rains poured almost incessantly, except a few minutes Sunday afternoon when the sun broke through for a short while. Some of the passengers went to the hotel and the rest sought out homes. It became necessary for a few to organize a pool for a fund to provide necessities for some of the passengers who were traveling without sufficient funds for "marooning."

The city of Marion suffered chiefly by a serious break in the water line, and efforts are being made to put the deep wells at the old distillery into condition, so water can be pumped into the city lines until repairs can be made. A car of flour was on a siding and it became necessary for officials to confiscate part of this Wednesday and rush it, via mule back, and any other way possible, to the Black Mountain section. At first, while the downpour continued, Marion had plenty of meat, but no vegetables. Later farmers came in with vegetables, finding a ready market—cash on delivery. scouting parties went into fields, picked up potatoes, beets and other food articles that had been washed up and took them into town to feed the crowds.

Marion people did all they could to make the passengers comfortable. No loss of life was reported in the immediate Marion section, and it appears that the line to Blacksburg did not suffer as much as some of the other lines. Conditions between Old Fort and Asheville are reported very bad. The first information to reach Marion came from Morganton way, by a man using a Ford awhile and fording and using another Ford awhile.—Greensboro News.


