GREAT REPUBLICAN CONVENTION MEETS

ORGANIZATION COMPLETED IN SHORT ORDER BY MOREHEAD, BUTLER AND DUNCAN.

“BIG FOUR” INCLUDES LINNEY

Convention Sends Telegram to Lodge Commending Republican Cause in Matter of Treaty and League.

Greensboro.—John Morehead, Marion Butler and E. Carl Duncan, completed the organization of the republican party of North Carolina. The formalities were gone through with at the state convention of the party and some two thousand delegates endorsed the new organization by cheering vociferously while the three shook hands on the stage of the Municipal theater here.

Frank Linney, unable to attend the convention on account of sickness, was included with Morehead, Butler and Duncan in the “Big Four,” who will attend the National convention at Chicago as delegates at large. Morehead was re-elected as national committeeman without opposition and Frank Linney succeeds himself as state chairman.

John J. Parker of Monroe was nominated for governor, and A. A. Whitner, Hickory, for United States senator. Judge Pritchard was endorsed as a candidate for President.

The convention sent a telegram to Chairman Lodge, of the senate foreign relations committee, commending him and his colleagues “who have prevented the confirmation of the league of nations unamended as attempted to be forced on the American people by President Wilson.”

Lenoir.—Town commissioners of Blowing Rock have called an election for March 30 to vote on the question of issuing \$15,000 street improvement bonds.

Winston-Salem.—On account of influenza in the town and country districts, the March term of Yadkin superior court, which convened at Yadkinville, adjourned soon after the clerk had called over the docket.

Raleigh.—The North Carolina Medical society will hold its annual convention in this city April 20-22, according to the plans for the meeting, while the North Carolina Hospital association will meet on the day before this convention opens, April 19.

Goldsboro.—After making a raid near Goldsboro, in which they destroyed a large moonshine still, revenue officers journeyed over to Duplin county, where they were successful in locating and destroying a steam outfit still of 500 gallons capacity.

Rutherfordton.—Spindale, a suburb of Rutherfordton, is on a great boom and has many new enterprises among which are a new roller mill, sash and door factory, garage and shoe shop. Other enterprises will be promoted at an early date.

Greensboro.—The organization meeting of the Co-operative Dairy Produce company was held here, officers being elected and plans made for the conduct of the business.

Pinehurst.—Three hundred and eighteen golfers, comprising the greatest field that has ever taken part in a single day of tournament play since the game was invented, started out on the first session of the qualifying round in the annual spring tournament.

Lenoir.—Clerk Oscar Coffey, of the Watauga county superior court, has sent in his resignation to Judge T. B. Finley, according to news received here by friends of Mr. Coffey. The office does not pay a sufficient amount is the reason given for Mr. Coffey's resignation.

If All our Dollars Were Piled one on the Other, by Standing on Highest One Could Tickle Angel's Feet.

Wilson.—At a banquet tendered recently by Messrs. Consolve and Untermeyer to their Eastern Carolina friends, the toastmaster, W. A. Edgerton, paid the following tribute to the big tobacco town and her folks: “Gentlemen, you are in the largest tobacco market in the world, located in the finest farming section on earth. If the tobacco sold on the Wilson market in 1919 was made into one cigarette it would belt the earth twice; if packed into the usual package there would be sufficient to give each man in the United States five packages; if the money paid for this tobacco was in silver dollars there would be sufficient to make two trains of thirty-five car loads each; if these dollars were laid edge to edge it would reach 639 miles; if piled into one pile you might stand on the high dollar and tickle the feet of the angels.”

“You must not think, however, that this is all, for which we are noted, for we have a citizenship unexcelled. Our women are a combination of incarnated star twinkles and pasteurized sun beams. Our men are the essence of patriotism, actuated by honesty and impelled with civic pride.”

Concord.—The delegates to the republican state convention, from Cabarrus county will go uninstructed. This was definitely determined at the county convention.

Lexington.—Engineer N. S. Mulligan has been busy making surveys on the Yadkin river for the purpose of determining the best place to build the proposed new double track bridge.

Durham.—Prof. E. D. Pusey, superintendent of the city schools, has returned to Durham after a ten-days absence, in Cleveland, Ohio, and visiting other cities. At Cleveland he attended the National Superintendent's Association of the United States.

Mebane.—A new million dollar spinning mill will be erected here soon by Mr. A. H. Carr, of the Durham Hosiery Mills, who was in the city last week and purchased 125 lots from the Mebane Land and Improvement Company for its erection.

Charlotte.—L. S. Tomlinson, of Wilson, president of North Carolina Branch of American Cotton Association, addressed mass meeting of Mecklenburg county farmers at Charlotte in interest of campaign to inaugurate a series of warehouses in Mecklenburg county and to enlarge membership of American Cotton Association in county.

Wadesboro.—At a meeting of the county board of health it was decided to let the quarantine remain in force for the present. A petition signed by many citizens asking a suspension of some of the restrictions on business houses and theaters was presented, but the board declined to interfere.

Goldsboro.—At a largely attended meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms a committee recently appointed to make a canvass among the business men of the city in the interest of establishing another daily newspaper in Goldsboro, submitted their report and announced that they had met with flattering success.

Salisbury.—A negro employed at the Ricks Tire company's place, on Main street, was arrested on a charge of the taking ways he is alleged to have had and when searched the officers say they found on him a key to the money vault. The negro claims that he can send to South Carolina and get a good recommendation from Mr. Cole Blease.

Hickory.—Mayor J. D. Elliott was in doubt whether to resign as head of this city or ask the board of aldermen to release the Elliott Building company from its contract to erect the municipal building at a saving of \$10,000 under the next lowest bid. The question was not raised on the night the contract was awarded.

Rutherfordton Eager to Help. Rutherfordton.—An enthusiastic mass meeting was held in the court house, attended by representative citizens of the five townships through which the Charlotte-Asheville highway runs.


The meeting was called by the county commissioners to get an expression of public opinion in regard to the county furnishing its part, or one-fourth of the money necessary to top soil the highway in this county. Attorney M. L. Edwards presided over the meeting.

Flu Bad in Wadesboro. Wadesboro.—There were six deaths from influenza-pneumonia in this county within twenty-four hours; two at Marvin; three at Peachland, and one in Wadesboro. It is reported that an emergency hospital will be established at Peachland, and also one for negroes at Deep Creek, where an epidemic is raging among members of that race.

James Johnson, a prominent and popular citizen of Marvin, died at his home there of influenza-pneumonia. He was ill but a short time.
