## SPICY HEARING STAGED IN COURT

Four hours of oratory and an appeal to the superior court on the part of the state was the sum total of a case before the recorder yesterday afternoon which involved, among other things, two cases of assault and the charge that the mayor of West Hickory pulled off a sham proceeding when he learned that the Hickory authorities had taken notice of an affair involving assault. The proceedings before the recorder were highly flavored, so much so, in fact, that one of the attorneys offered to thrash another, and insisted on doing it unless he should be accorded proper respect.

To start near the beginning, Mr. Ed. Hammond of West Hickory some time ago lifted his foot sideways in the direction of Walter Bumgarner's shirt. Walter, who worked for Mr. Hammond, did not like it and told his father, Mr. G. D. Bumgarner, who then called to pay his respects. Mr. Hammond is said to have raised his right arm and, quickly straightening it, caused the elder Bumgarner to touch the ground full length.

A warrant was sworn out against Mr. Hammond in two cases. This was about September 25. Mayor W. P. Austin is employed by Mr. Hammond, and Mr. Bumgarner felt that the wheels of justice were turning too slowly to suit him, so on October 1 he appeared before Recorder Campbell in Hickory and stated his case. The new papers were served yesterday morning.

In the meantime the West Hickory authorities got busy and served the papers too, but witnesses said the Hickory papers were executed first, thus giving the Hickory recorder jurisdiction. Between the serving of papers and the convening of the recorder's court, a trial was held in West Hickory and Mayor Austin fined Mr. Hammond \$1 and costs in each case about \$9 in all.

The point raised in the recorder's court was that, inasmuch as the Hickory papers were executed before those of West Hickory, the trial in West Hickory was not a proper trial, and Recorder Campbell was asked to rule accordingly. The case was so tri-ling, he said, that he did not feel like trying the witnesses to the expense and trouble of appearing before him at another trial and he accordingly held that the West Hickory mayor's handling of the case would pass muster.

### Lengthy Arguments.

There was argument by four lawyers for four hours on the several points raised, but the recorder was firm. During the course of the hearing Prosecuting Attorney C. W. Bagby read a statement in which the opinion was expressed that the entire West Hickory proceedings were nothing short of a fraud, whereupon Mr. C. L. Whitener replied that his answer to that was that it was a little worse than the "retort courtoeus."

Mr. Bagby offered to scour up the floor with the other lawyer, but explanations were made, and the argument proceeded.  
**Court on Trial.**  
The upshot of the matter is that the West Hickory court will be on trial at Newton when superior court convenes if the state's lawyers decide to carry the case that far. There seemed to be no doubt that Mayor Austin acted in haste about the time the Hickory officers got busy. Recorder Campbell said he might be in the wrong, but he was not thinking so much of the dignity of his court, which apparently had been "outed," as he was the convenience of the dozen or more witnesses who would have to appear here or at Newton.

In looking over the docket of the West Hickory mayor, the recorder observed that the fine imposed on Mr. Hammond was the same as fines imposed for other offenses of that nature.  
Mr. Bagby and Mr. D. L. Russell represented the prosecution and Messrs. M. H. Yount and C. L. Whitener the defense.

It was said after the trial that the case would have been appealed to the superior court in any event, inasmuch as it would have been impossible to satisfy both sides.

### Fighting at the Cradle.

Carrying the war into Asiatic Turkey, forestalling the Germans in their ambition to colonize the districts now being ravaged by the oncoming arms of the Britons, the English have started war at the cradle of the race. 


