

SOME FINE EXHIBITS AT CALDWELL FAIR

Lenoir, Oct. 15.—Floral hall is a picture of beauty. The ladies have vied with each other in a charming rivalry, and the variety of the work of their fair hands holds you with a charm. The display is one of the largest ever seen at a fair, and embraces every variety of art and handicraft.

The most interesting display is made by the Bonnie Blue Flag chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy. It contains relics and curios, many unheard of before. Baskets that were in Laniel Boone's family; quilts made in 1832, a suit of clothes made in 1820, and other things too numerous to mention. This corner holds the crowd in close attention.

The annexed goods and preserve department is another wonder display of the thrifty Caldwell county womanhood, and shows that they know how to preserve good things, as well as their husbands.

The Caswell Training School for mental defectives at Kinston has a fine display of the work of these unfortunate, and gives you a clear idea of how they are employed, as well as the buildings at the place.

The display of the Caldwell Boy's Corn Club is an inspiration. The exhibit of fine corn, sweet and Irish potatoes is a revelation in farm products. Ahead of anything seen in many a day.

Anthony Jones displays a pumpkin weighing 46 pounds.

The "Dula Beauty" apples, now so famous, show up more beautiful than ever.

Hall Cobb, a lad of 13 years, shows a watch charm, a miniature anvil, and other small anvils, that he made by hand out of brass. He is a genius.

Mrs. Lou L. Moore exhibits a chest of various useful and ornamental articles, carved by her out of native woods, using only a small pocket knife. It is a work of art.

Misses Nora, Mildred and Sarah Steel have on exhibition specimens of their handwork in wood carving, and painting, that shows remarkable especially as the young artist is in her first year.

"Bill Goose," possibly the largest goose in this or any other county, is owned by little Miss Louise Harrison.

The poultry department is one of the finest ever displayed at any fair. A brilliant reception was held in the floral hall Tuesday evening, from 8 to 9:30. In the receiving line were Mr. J. H. Beall, president of the fair association, and Mrs. Beall; J. W. Whisnant, secretary; H. W. Courtney, treasurer, with their wives, and the vice-presidents from the various townships, with their wives. They were greeted by a large concourse of people, and was one of the charming social events of the fair.

HORSE IS KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE COLLISION

Raleigh, Oct. 15.—The automobile of President J. H. King of King's Business College, Raleigh and Charlotte, ran into a delivery wagon of the Model Steam Laundry on New Bern avenue and killed the horse and smashed the wagon badly. Mr. King was being driven by a chauffeur. Both vehicles were going in the same direction and the driver claims that the steering gear failed to respond.

FUNERAL TODAY OF REV. A. L. CROUSE

The Rev. A. I. Crouse, whose funeral was conducted today from St. Stephen's church, was one of the four founders of Lenoir College, and merited tribute was paid to him by President Fritz on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of that institution. Mr. Crouse had been invited to make a talk before the large gathering here last month, but was too feeble to be present.

Rev. W. P. Cline of White Rock, S. C., is the only survivor of that quartet which is responsible for the location of Lenoir College in Hickory. The others were Dr. J. C. Moser and Dr. A. A. Yoder. Mr. Crouse's death in Charlottesville Wednesday afternoon recalled his signal service to the Lutherans of this community.

The remains arrived in the city this morning and were taken to Christ Evangelical Lutheran church, where they lay in state until the hour of the funeral. The service was conducted from St. Stephen's church, near the city, which Mr. Crouse served as pastor for 18 years and which he loved devotedly. The service was conducted by Rev. H. B. Hemmeter in the presence of an arrowing congregation.

As a token of respect exercises at Lenoir College were suspended this morning. Mr. Crouse, in addition to his interest in establishing the college formerly was a member of its faculty.




