—Extension of time for filing income and excess profits returns has been made from March 1 to April 1.
—James Spencer, a former resident of Hamlet, died in Raleigh Saturday of pneumonia. Interment at Hamlet Sunday.
—The time limit in which soldiers may take out the government insurance was due to expire Feb. 12th, but last Saturday Congress extended time to April 12.
—Marriage licenses issued the past week to Will Tillman and Pearl Covington, col., the 8th. To John Rufus Howard and Marguerite Isabel Paschal, white, the 12th.
—The Bostick Local, No. 2035 (the only Farmers' Union Local in the county) last Saturday erected a warehouse about four miles north of Ellerbe. The Local has 18 loyal members.

—Coburn's Minstrels will appear at the Hamlet Opera House on Thursday night, Feb. 14th, instead of Wednesday night, Feb. 13th, as advertised in our last issue. Heatless days caused a re-arrangement of dates.

—No more heatless and closing Mondays, unless the weather runs amuck again. The closing order was lifted for last Monday in the southern states, and so the places of business in Rockingham kept open as usual. The order was lifted yesterday for the northern states.

—Material is being placed for an enlargement of the new 30x78 building of the Diggs Farm Dairy; the addition will be 30x50. At present 40 Jersey cows are milked at this excellent dairy, and the increased room will permit of an increase to 60 head. The daily capacity just now is 90 gallons a day.

—The State Democratic Executive Committee will meet in Raleigh Tuesday night, March 5th, to fix the time and place for holding the state convention, to fix a common day for holding precinct meetings or primary elections, and to fix a common day for holding county conventions for selecting delegates to the state convention.

—A 75-bu. grist mill belonging to A. B. Chandler, just west of the city, was destroyed by fire last Friday night. The loss of groceries, building, corn and machinery amounts to \$900. Mr. Chandler is rebuilding and has a new outfit and will begin grinding again this week; all customers who had corn with him at the time of the fire will be reimbursed.

—W. A. (Little Bill) McDonald, who represents the U. S. Fidelity & Guaranty Co., of Baltimore, Md., informs the Post-Dispatch that during the past year judicial bonds filed in the superior court of Richmond county were for a total liability of \$73,727. The bonds were filed by 26 administrators and executors and 8 guardians. Surety companies signed 5 bonds for a total of \$40,000, and individuals pledged their possessions for \$43,727 on the other 29 bonds.
