When we become a milk consuming people and live more on whole wheat products, more fruits and more vegetables, materials giving the body an ample supply of vitamins as well as nutritive elements, we shall become a healthier, happier people with fewer ills and doctor bills, CREAMERY OR NO CREAMERY!

We owe it to ourselves to own sufficient cows to supply each member of the family all the milk and butter they will consume. Then sell enough to city people to bring in a daily purse for expenses. Our cash income will then be a clear income, weevil or no weevil.

Three men have called on me and indicated their willingness to pledge all the way from "a few" to "ten" cows if a creamery is established. All did not speak at once, and the opportunity is still a privilege. Who next?
