COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Indictments Presented by the Territorial Grand Jury.

TUESDAY, May 4, 1875. Court convened at 10 o'clock A. M. His Honor, Judge Bennett presiding.

In the case of Chas. Green vs. M. U. Hoyt et al., amended pleading allowed by the court.

In the case of Emily Hall vs. D. T. Bramble, administrator of the estate of J. D. Vanderhule, the demurrer was overruled. Judgment for plaintiff.

The calendar was then called and certain days fixed for the trial of certain cases on account of the non residence of parties and witnesses.

The court then took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M., when the Grand Jury returned with true bills against Lewis Kennedy and Charles Porter, and not a true bill against Thomas Fletcher.

Lewis Kennedy was brought in and arraigned for the assault with intent to injure L. M. Kee whereupon S. A. Bently, Esq., asked for time till to-morrow to answer which was granted.

Charles Porter was also arraigned for assault with intent to injure Josephine Porter whereupon P. K. Faulk, Esq., who appeared with Mr. Splink for defendant, asked for time till to-morrow to answer, which was granted.

Thomas Fletcher under arrest for petit larceny was discharged from custody, the grand jury having failed to find a bill.

The jury were summoned for the trial of cases for to-morrow, and the court adjourned till 10 o'clock A. M.

Return of the Commissioner from New York.

Hon. Jacob Brauch, one of the territorial commissioners of immigration has returned from New York City after a month's absence.

He gives a very encouraging report of the prospects for immigration to Dakota during the coming summer.

He found the Mennonites of Lancaster county, Pa., working very earnestly for Dakota.

They have become satisfied, after a very thorough personal investigation of the advantages presented by different sections of the government land states and territories that Dakota leads all others in the substantial inducements it offers to the agricultural classes, to which nearly all the Russian immigration into this country at the present belong.

The Pennsylvania parties are deeply interested in the welfare of their countrymen now arriving in America and are willing and abundantly able to assist them, which they have done most nobly, and they are also wisely anxious to see them settled in Dakota, where in their opinion, climate, soil and prospects for future development, are much more favorable than any new country under the United States flag.

A large number of families will arrive at New York about the 1st of June and thereafter at frequent intervals during the summer.

Mr. Brauch will be on hand to meet and greet them and conduct them to their land of promise.
