STABBING AFFRAY.

Tom Fletcher Falls a Knife Into George Beck's Bowels.

Early last evening Tom Fletcher and George Beck, two men notorious in the police annals of Yankton, got into a difficulty on First street, which resulted in a rough-and-tumble fight between the two. Fletcher got the worst of the scrimmage, and expressed his willingness to give up beat. He was released, but was again attacked by Beck and severe punishment administered, which drew from Fletcher a reiteration of his previous statement that he was fully satisfied with the shape the encounter had assumed. Beck let him up and Fletcher started for the river to wash off the blood flowing from his hurts, when Beck gave chase and manifested an intention to repeat the dose. Jim McCormick, standing by, thought the thing had gone far enough, and interfered in behalf of Fletcher, telling Beck to let him alone. Fletcher, encouraged by the prospect of assistance, drew a pocket knife and walked up to Beck and stabbed him once in the bowels, just below the umbilicus, the blade penetrating some two or three inches. Fletcher was arrested by Deputy Marshal Read and lodged in the lockup. Beck was conveyed to Hardin's saloon, near by the scene of the encounter, where he received medical assistance. It is difficult to anticipate the result of the wound, as from its nature, no pronounced opinion can be given regarding its character. Both men have a hard name here. Beck has been in jail until recently for mayhem, and Fletcher is not unacquainted with the inside appearance of the jail walls.

The Bon Homme Horse Thief Case.

Ed De Witt, who last December departed from Springfield with H. C. Davison's team, \$150 of D. U. Currie's money and the affections and jewelry of some of Springfield's fair daughters, was arrested Friday morning at the Beadle House, Bon Homme, by constable L. M. Church, on charge of grand larceny. The information which led to his arrest was given by H. L. Ward, who was acquainted with De Witt when in Springfield, and who recognized him on sight, much to De Witt's discomfort. He denied being the person named in the warrant until confronted by the witnesses from Springfield, when he weakened and wanted to settle the matter. He was arraigned at Bon Homme before Judge Bradford, and through his counsel, E. G. Armstrong, waived examination, and was held to bail in the sum of \$500 and committed to the charge of Sheriff Burdick. A dispatch reached Springfield yesterday morning to the effect that De Witt stole a horse at Vermillion a few days since, which he disposed of at Bon Homme. De Witt was brought to Yankton yesterday by the sheriff of Bon Homme county and placed in jail to await trial.

THE VERMILION WILL CASE.

Rebecca J. Curllis vs. Administrator of Estate of George Curllis, Deceased—Testimony Continued.

Mrs. Washburn's testimony continued: Mrs. Hurst did not live at my house before George Curllis died. She came there in September after he died, and lived there till March.

Mrs. Maggie Davenport sworn.—Am not personally acquainted with plaintiff, as at St. Nicholas hotel and was introduced to her as Mrs. Curllis—this was three years ago. Several persons were there at the time. Mrs. Maxim is a sister of Geo. Curllis, and introduced me to plaintiff as Mrs. Curllis. Mrs. McCapes, Mrs. Sloan, Mrs. Maxim, Mr. Maxin and Mrs. Weighman were the parties there.

Mrs. Eon McCapes sworn.—Reside six miles north-east of Vermillion. Was not acquainted with plaintiff until she was introduced to her as Mrs. Curllis—this was three years ago. Several persons were there at the time. Mrs. Maxim is a sister of Geo. Curllis, and introduced me to plaintiff as Mrs. Curllis. Mrs. McCapes, Mrs. Sloan, Mrs. Maxim, Mr. Maxin and Mrs. Weighman were the parties there.

Re direct.—Was introduced to Mrs. Curllis when she was a girl. Was introduced by Mrs. Odell in May '72. Mrs. Odell is a sister of Geo. Curllis. Mrs. Curllis was in her buggy in the road. Some one asked who it was in the buggy, and when introduced to her as Mrs. Curllis, she said she was introduced before. No one was there but us three. Mrs. Wright at the house asked who the lady was in the buggy.

Mrs. T. J. Sloan sworn.—Know the plaintiff. Was introduced to her at the St. Nicholas hotel. Mrs. Maxim introduced her as Mrs. Curllis, George's wife. Live in Vermillion. Have lived there three years last March. Saw George Curllis ride with the plaintiff before and after marriage. Saw them when it was reported they were going to get married. The general report was that they were married. This occasion is the same as that spoken of by Mrs. Davenport.

Wright's name was on the fire and we happened there. They drove up and when we went into the kitchen Mrs. Odell introduced me to her as George's wife. Saw her once before at a funeral. Mrs. Odell said she was a nice little woman, and talked kind of good about her I thought. The funeral was a year or two before the introduction I spoke about. The introduction was in May '73, and the funeral a year or so before. Were in the kitchen, this was at the time the house was on fire.
