From the Missoulian "Extra" and the letter of Truthful James, it appears that the Kootenai Indians have killed three men near Flathead lake, are killing and stealing stock, that other ravages are apprehended, and St. Louis, Oct. 6.

What the circumstances were in relation to the killing of Allen, Holan and Campbell, who were the aggressors, or what led to the murder we are not advised. It were better for the community if it should prove that the provocation was by the white men, or that personal grievances were at the bottom of it, as an unprovoked outrage for blood and plunder would indicate general and protracted troubles. The confederated tribes of that region number, we believe, some 1,500 or 2,000, largely outnumbering the whites, through whose settlements they are scattered and with whose lo. 1.31. calities and stock ranges they are as familiar as the settlers themselves. The statement of our correspondent that the Indians in the vicinity of Missoula are insolent and threatening, coupled with the facts that there has been recently some disaffection among the agency Indians in relation to their chiefs, and that stock is being killed and driven off, gives a darker color to the situation. While there is no doubt of the ability of the settlers to eventually check these depredations and suppress the perpetrators it is unfortunate there is not military within reach to at once take cognizance of this matter and, if required, to operate against the Indians.
