CONGRESSIONAL.

Washington, May 22.—The president presented the secretary of the treasury's answer to a resolution regarding the method of the revenue service in subtracting the tare on foreign sugars imported in boxes.

The bill was passed extending the northern boundary of Nebraska so as to include the present territory of Dakota south of the 43d parallel east of the Keya Paha river.

After a few unimportant bills were passed, Mr. Morgan supported his joint rule for counting the electoral votes.

Washington, May 22.—There was much confusion over the consideration of the public building bills, and when a motion to go into committee was made a point was raised that there was no quorum.

Finally the house decided, 146 to 40, to go into committee and Mr. Bragg moved to reconsider, which was tabled, and the house considered in committee the reports from the committee on public buildings.

WASHINGTON.

Indian Agent Appointed. Washington, May 22.—The president nominated Jonathan A. Biggs, of Illinois, as Indian agent at the Colorado River agency in Arizona.

More Howling to Take Place. Washington, May 22.—Hanson and Riley have forwarded their entries for the race at Providence, June 17th. They signed to-day new articles for the race Wednesday regarding the irresponsible holder of the original articles.

Washington, May 22.—The probabilities for the upper Mississippi and lower Missouri valleys are: Falling followed by rising barometer, warmer southeast veering to cooler west winds, partly cloudy weather and occasional rains in the northern portion.

FIRES.

Dwelling Burned to Hide a Crime. Lock Haven, Pa., May 22.—The residence of Mrs. Batzer Friedler was burned this morning. The remains of Mrs. Friedler were found in the ruins. There are suspicions of murder, robbery and arson.

Lives Lost in a Burning House. Chesterville, Ont., May 22.—Two old persons, named Strader, lost their lives in the burning of their house last night.

Port Huron, May 22.—The Northern Transportation company's propeller Maine burned to the water's edge this morning. The cargo and hull were both insured; amounts unknown.

FOREIGN.

Paris, May 22.—The strikers at Ribeaucourt decrease in numbers daily. Two Belgians and a Dutchman have been arrested charged with inciting the men against the masters.

Berlin, May 22.—The crown princess of Germany, Queen Victoria's daughter, has returned to Potsdam after six months' sojourn in Australia, Austria and Italy.

London, May 22.—Trickett cannot accept Boyd's challenge at present to race in England. Trickett's great desire is to meet Hanlan.

London, May 22.—The failure of the Philadelphia and Reading railroad company and Philadelphia coal and iron company caused a semi-panic in the American railroad market.
