POLITICAL.

Indiana Republican Convention.

Indianapolis, June 17.—The republican state convention met at 10 a. m. in the wigwam and was called to order by Hon. John C. New, chairman of the state central committee.

The following platform and resolutions were adopted:

The platform reaffirms and endorses the resolutions of the Chicago convention; recognizes in the Chicago nominees representative republicans and statesmen, who may well be entrusted with the administration of national government, and commends them to the support of the people; recognizes the right of foreigners to emigrate hither, and the right of native born citizens to migrate from one state to another without vexatious investigation as to their motives; congratulates the people of Indiana on the recent constitutional amendments as tending to economy; the free ballot and secret ballot is giving the unfittest of the democrats to administer the state government; reaffirms devotion to free schools; expresses gratitude to the soldiers which should be embodied in the national laws enacted from time to time.

The convention proceeded with the nomination for candidates state ticket. For governor the following names were presented: Gen. A. D. Straight, of Marion county; W. H. McKee, of Madison county; Dr. A. O. Burgess, of Marion county; Hon. A. G. Porter, of Marion county; Hon. J. M. Butler, of Marion; Gen. W. P. Graham, of Madison; and Hon. M. C. Cumbach, of Decatur county.

The first ballot resulted as follows: Straight, 467 1/2; Porter, 216 1/2; Burgess, 100; Graham, 34; McKee, 14; Butler, 5 1/2; Cumbach, 14.

On the second ballot there was no choice. On the third ballot, Hon. Albert G. Porter was nominated, receiving 637 1/2 votes.

For lieutenant governor, Thos. Hanna; for judge of the supreme court, third district, Hon. Byron K. Elliott; for judge of the fifth district, Wm. H. Woods, were nominated.

Arkansas Greenbackers.

Little Rock, June 18.—At last night's session the greenback state convention adopted a platform and nominated a state ticket, as follows: For governor, Wm. P. Parks, of Lafayette; secretary of state, Chas. E. Tobey, of Hope, and treasurer, Wm. R. Watson, of Washington.

Death of a Prominent Iowa Editor.

Keokuk, Ia., June 17.—Judge J. B. Howell died at his residence here this morning at four o'clock. He was born July 4th, 1816, near Newark, Ohio; graduated from Miami university in 1837; studied law with Hocking H. Hunt; came to Iowa and settled at Keosauqua and began the practice of law. He soon became a leader of the whig party in Iowa and in 1845 started the Western Valley Whig. He transferred the paper to Keokuk, changing its name to the Gate City and retaining his proprietorship until his death. When the republican party in Iowa was organized he was active and one of the foremost in it. In 1870 he was elected to the United States senate to succeed Jas. W. Grimes. For some years past and until the expiration of its term of existence in March last he was one of the southern claims commission. He came home from Washington a few weeks ago in bad health, but gave promise of rallying and his friends were hopeful for his recovery. Last Thursday he began to suffer acutely, and after finding some periods of relief sank away to the end this morning. He leaves a wife and four children, three of the latter here. One is in the regular army with the troops in Colorado.

Games and Fish Association.

Des Moines, June 18.—At the state tournament to-day of the association for the protection of game and fish, A. H. Granger won the first prize of purse No. 3, amounting to \$150 cash; R. O'Brien won the second prize of \$110 cash; Smith & Templeton won the third and fourth. This was ten single birds, twenty-six yards, both barrels. At the business meeting, Cedar Rapids was selected as the next place of meeting. J. L. Williams was chosen president, J. N. Welch, of Keokuk, first vice president, H. W. Smythe, of Des Moines, second vice president, J. N. Whittam, of Cedar Rapids, secretary, and A. C. Taylor, treasurer.

Recruiting American Troops for Mexico.

Tucson, Ariz., June 17.—Gen. Marquez has returned to Sonora with 75 men recruited in Tucson. It is thought he will go direct to Chihuahua.

FOREIGN.

To Be Removed.

Constantinople, June 17.—The Turkish authorities have decided to remove some restrictions on dispatch of political telegrams.

Amnesty.

Paris, June 17.—The left centre have unanimously pronounced against amnesty. A deputation of the republican left came in an interview with the Detached cabinet last evening to urge the government to take the initiative in bringing forward an amnesty. At a meeting of deputies of the republican left, sixty-five voted for immediate discussion of amnesty, 15 against, and 15 abstained from voting. At a meeting of the committee on the Trans-Salazara railway it was resolved to ask members of the government for a further grant of sixty million francs in order that the committee may start for Africa immediately to avail themselves of the fine season.

Fighting in Buenos Ayres. London, June 18.—A statement is current that fighting has begun in Buenos Ayres.

Prussian Elections.

Berlin, June 18.—The elections in Wurtemberg, Hesse Cassel, Brandenburg and Prussia resulted in favor of an uncompromising constitutional government. The Journal admires the change that has taken place in public sentiment.

Bradlaugh's Case.

London, June 18.—The report in the house of commons on the case of Bradlaugh states that there is a precedent for the refusal of the house to allow a member to take the parliamentary oath. The committee hold that the mere compliance by Bradlaugh with the form used when the oath is taken would not be the taking of the oath, and that the house can and ought to prevent him from going through such form. Therefore the committee advise that he be allowed to affirm.

An Alleged French Conspiracy.

Paris, June 18.—Figaro prints an exposure of an alleged legitimist conspiracy. Count de Chambord, the bonapartist pretender, is said to be privy to the plot, and that large sums of money have been collected to buy the adhesion of influential republicans.

A Scene in the House of Commons.

London, June 17.—In the house of commons to-day, the speaker having expressed his opinion on the motion of O'Donnell's former question concerning La Com, O'Donnell endeavored to put the question in the original form. He said he desired to bring the speaker's action before the house. The speaker threatened other steps if he persisted. O'Donnell, after an excited scene, declined to put the question and quitted the house.

Prizes Awarded.

Berlin, June 17.—The prizes to exhibitors in the international fishery exhibition were distributed to-day. The first honorary prize was awarded to Prof. Baird, of the Smithsonian Institute of the United States, who will receive a gold medal and address.

Auburn, N. J., June 17.—Lewis Chatterton was killed, and five firemen wounded by the fall of a wall at a fire here last night.

A Woman Outraged and Murdered.

Little Rock, Ark., June 17.—A white woman named Stevens, living one mile from Pine Bluff, was ravished and afterwards murdered yesterday morning. The circumstances pointed to and led to the arrest of John Grier and one Jackson, negroes, and G. W. Dutton and Robt. Connelly, whites. Dutton will probably be released. Cincinnati, June 15.—Charles Bleker, who was injured at the millers' exhibition yesterday by the explosion of a steam pipe, is in a hopier condition. He is not from Texas as at first reported but from Edinburg, Illinois. The test of the automatic shut-off of steam engines at the exhibition is in progress. There are five engines to be tested.

Des Moines, June 15.—At the tournament to-day of the game association for the protection of game and fish, J. C. Hoffmann of Council Bluffs won the championship, and a \$200 gun; A. W. Riemann \$125 in cash and a \$25 gun; H. A. Olook of Geneva won \$90 in cash and a \$10 bird trap; J. S. Oliver of Council Bluffs and D. Jackson of Avoca divided the fourth prize; O. W. Budd won \$140 in cash, the first prize of the second purse; A. H. Goodman won the second prize, a \$100 gun; J. S. Smith of Algona won the third prize, \$60 in cash and a \$10 rubber overcoat.

New York, June 15.—A breakfast given Edwin Booth for the deaf-mutes at noon to-day by his friends, who included many of the prominent lights of the bench, bar, pulpit and stage. Cincinnati, June 15.—At a meeting of press representatives appointed by the local committee in charge of the arrangements for the national democratic convention, it was decided that only legitimate representatives of the daily press, properly accredited, will be provided with seats in the convention. Those upon their arrival, will register at 200 west Fourth street. Representatives of the weekly press must look to their delegates for tickets. None but actual telegraphic correspondents for the daily press will be admitted to the press platform. Seats will be assigned and tickets delivered as fast as the committee can do the work after the registry is made.

Chicago, June 15.—A peculiar case of child murder has misled the people of Wilmette, a suburban town, for the past week, and has caused a rigid investigation into the matter. Three weeks ago Willie Meyer disappeared from his home in that place, and two weeks later his body was found in a cistern under a sitcher. The coroner failed to solve the mystery, and up to the present time there is nothing but conjecture as to the cause of his death. The neighbors assert that Mr. and Mrs. Meyer being Adventists, have murdered their child. The parents claim that the neighbors abducted him in hopes of getting a reward, but being unacquainted, killed him and threw his body in the cistern to turn suspicion against his parents. Official cognizance of the crime has been secured, and a rigid examination will doubtless bring out the actual facts of the case.
