POLITICAL.

A Stalwart Contest in Missouri. St. Louis, June 19.—The democratic congressional convention of the eighth district, which has been in session three days at Kansas City, shows no signs of completing its labors.

Horatio Seymour says, "Four Candidate I Cannot Be."

Cincinnati, June 19.—The Enquirer of this forenoon says its editor has received a personal dispatch from Horatio Seymour, and that it violates no confidence in printing the following extract: "I cannot accept the nomination if it is made, under any circumstances."

Gen. Garfield on His Way West. Harrisburg, Pa., June 19.—Gen. Garfield arrived here to-day. He was met at the depot by a large crowd and made a short speech.

WASHINGTON.

A Presidential Excursion. Washington, June 19.—President Hayes expects to leave for California with Secretary Thompson and party about the first of July.

Washington, June 19.—Gen. Jno. A. Sutter, discoverer of gold in California, died here yesterday. He had been sick a week with inflammation of the kidneys.

A Private Arctic Expedition. Washington, June 19.—The Gulnare, Capt. Howgate's arctic vessel, leaves Monday for the arctic regions.

The Weather. Washington, June 19.—The indications for the upper Mississippi and lower Missouri valleys are: Warmer, partly cloudy weather, southerly winds and falling barometer.

FOREIGN.

Church Bill Rejected. Berlin, June 19.—The lower house of the Prussian diet has rejected the second clause of the church bill.

Third House Divides in England. London, June 19.—In the house of commons last night Lord Eliche, liberal, gave notice that he would introduce two bills intended as a burlesque of the view that British property holders take of the Irish bill.

The Irish Land Bill. London, June 19.—The second reading of the Irish land bill in the house of commons has been fixed for the 22nd inst. The bill provides that until the 31st of December 1881, ejectments for non-payment of rent in scheduled districts where distress is prevalent, shall be deemed a disturbance of the tenant by the landlord within the meaning of the landlord and tenant act of 1870, and the tenant shall be entitled to compensation in the discretion of the judge of the county court if the non-payment of rent is caused by prevailing distress and the tenant is willing to continue in occupation upon reasonable terms as to rent, arrears of rent, and otherwise, such terms are unreasonably refused by the landlord.

Crops Destroyed by Hail. Geneva, June 19.—A hail storm has ruined the crops in the district of Parrentzen.

Plenary Amnesty in France. Paris, June 19.—In the chamber of deputies to-day Premier Dr. Freycinet introduced a bill for plenary amnesty to all political offenders.

Legislation for Ireland. London, June 19.—The home rulers have resolved to oppose progress on the bill for the relief of Irish distress until the government reduces the bill, founded on the principle of the new clause proposed by the chief secretary for Ireland enlarging the powers of local boards for awarding compensation to occupiers of the land.

The Price of Wheat Established. Chicago, June 19.—The price for selling contracts for No. 2 spring wheat for May delivery has been fixed by an arbitration committee at \$1.13 1/4 per bushel, the price at which cash wheat closed on the 31st. It had been charged that the deal was cornered.

CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.

Murdered by a Drunken Blacksmith. Cincinnati, June 19.—At Port Jefferson, near Sidney, Ohio, on Thursday, David L. Shank, a young blacksmith, attacked two widows in their house and killed one, Mrs. Lane, aged 94, the weapon being a fence rail. He was driven away before he killed the other woman. He feigned insanity when arrested, but it is said he was only drunk.

FIRES.

Coal Destroyed. Philadelphia, June 19.—Early to-day the coal at the stills and tanks of Malcom Lloyd near Point Bevier, burned. Loss, \$80,000.

Saw and Flouring Mill. Snow Hill, June 19.—Richardson & Co.'s saw, piling and flouring mill burned. Loss, \$25,000.

In a Mississippi Town. Memphis, June 19.—A fire at Starkville, Miss., yesterday destroyed half the town. Loss, estimated at \$100,000; insurance, \$30,000.

A Whopper About Dakota via Chicago. Chicago, June 19.—Travelers coming from Minnesota and Dakota represent that section as being literally under water, and the damage to crops and other property incalculable.

Death of a Prominent Illinoisan. Springfield, June 19.—Hon. David L. Phillips, postmaster of Springfield, died to-day after a lingering illness in his fifty-seventh year. He was a native of Illinois and had been prominently identified with state politics and affairs for many years. He was appointed as marshal for southern Illinois in 1861, and Pennsylvania in 1877. From 1883 to 1878 he was chief promoter of the State Journal. From 1866 he had been president of the Belleville and Southern Illinois railroad, which was built under his management.

St. Louis, June 19.—A dispatch from Fairbury, Illinois, says J. Bradbury, an editorial writer on the New York Tribune under Horace Greeley, and later one of the associate editors of the New York World, died on Thursday evening, aged 69.

The Des Moines Tournament. Des Moines, June 19.—At the state tournament of the association for the protection of game and fish yesterday, the Des Moines sporting club won the state championship cup. In the shoot to-day for a \$200 purse Wheeler, of Fort Dodge, and Goodnow, of Medipolis, won the first prize; Hills of Des Moines, the second; Brimer of Marshalltown, and Mullis, of Council Bluffs, won the third.

The President in Ohio. Columbus, June 19.—The president and his wife and son have arrived.

Latest by Mail. Louisville, June 17.—Senator Vance of North Carolina, was married to Miss Florence Martin to-day.

Washington, June 17.—The president, Mrs. Hayes and Webb C. Hayes expect to leave to-morrow for Columbus, Ohio, where they will spend Sunday. From Columbus they go to the Kenyon college commencement.

San Francisco, June 17.—At a meeting of the Metropolitan Baptist church, Rev. I. S. Kalkoch, pastor, last evening, preambles and resolutions were adopted strongly indorsing Kalkoch. The resolutions say the members of the church had heard all the charges that have been made against their pastor, but his pure and exemplary life has proven them false; that his labors in behalf of his church and his property under his care have earned for him the gratitude of every member of the congregation.

Denver, Col., June 14.—A News-Leader special gives the result of the meeting of the miners union. The meeting was largely attended by the members of the union. Gens. Cook and James, and their staffs and a number of prominent miners were also present. As the matter now stands the miners are to go to work at the old prices, the union not to be disbanded. The mine owners and managers make no concessions except that they will use their influence in favor of a general adoption of the eight hour system. Moony, Read and other leaders are guaranteed immunity from arrest if they return if the miners go to work to-morrow. All the mines will resume with full force. A large number of mines are already working full force, and confidence is generally restored.

Brattleboro, Vt., June 17.—To-day's developments only confirm previous reports of the utter failure of First National bank and possibly future developments may add to, rather than decrease, the liabilities, which are now placed at \$450,487. The assets consist of about \$218,000 in notes, many known to be fraudulent; government bonds in Washington \$10,000; reserve fund \$45,000, \$700 in cash and supposed good notes and whatever may be realized from the sale of Waite's property under attachment. The latter is variously estimated at from \$30,000 to \$50,000. Telegrams have been received to-day showing additional fraudulent transactions in New York. Three hundred shares of bank stock had been placed in the Sixth National bank in New York as collateral, on which Waite had received about \$15,000. This stock may have belonged to Waite, it being understood that it was a large shareholder, but it may turn out to be an over-issue.
